PUBLIC SCHOOLS AND TEACHERS

Canada Baptist. W. Ross, the Ontario Miniser of Education, in an address a few days since, to the students and staff of the normal and model schools at Ottawa, said that the Normal School term would in a short time be extended to at least ten months, so that teachers might receive a proper and much desired training. Special training in the science and art of teaching good and necessary, and we daresay a lengthening of the Normal chool term will in many cases improve the teacher's fitness for his or ner work. But it is at the bottom our opinion, rather than at any igher point, the work of improvement school methods should comence. The most serious defects arise rom the immaturity in mind and the ducational deficiencies of many of the third class teachers. The second class and first class teachers who go ou om the normal schools are, as a rule, efficient. But a large majority of the are taught by third class tea-Many of these are boys and girls in their teens. A very large majority of all the children of the prov-ince get their whole education from these boys and girls. Is it to be wonat that the papers teem mplaints and criticisms? Why should the department spend more oney in the training of teachers the over-competition in the pubc schools has reduced salaries to gures so utterly inadequate that these chools are fast passing into the hands of these incompetent and inexperienced oys and girls? If the minimum age or the profession were raised even to or 21, and the minimum qualifica-ions for a certificate increased in proportion, more would be done to im-prove the status of the schools and nake them what they ought to be, han by all the improvements that can be made in the machinery of the


