A Challenge Answered.

When Sir Charles Tupper recently counseled his friends to seize the Provincial Governments, that they might be used as agencies to aid him to regain power at Ottawa, he was at least frank.

Two provinces have already responded to the challenge of the Opposition leader.

Nova Scotia and Quebec by very large majorities, embracing all classes of the community, have informed Sir Charles Tupper that they do not mean to allow their resources to be squandered away in the vain effort to rehabilitate him or his family.

Ontario will be heard from next. The people of the banner province will give an equally emphatic verdict against the interference of the Nova Scotian knight. This province means to make its own affairs, and it can best do so by retaining in its service the tried statesmen whose record cannot be successfully assailed.

There was very keen competition for appointment to positions on the Indian guard of honor, which left Calcutta on Saturday to participate in the Diamond Jubilee festivities in the British metropolis. The troops were drawn from the imperial and native cavalry regiments, and consist of 50 officers—all stalwarts. They will have a three-months' holiday, and will be one of the striking features in the procession of June 22.

Visit of a Premier.

Premier Seddon, of New Zealand, who is now the guest of Lord Aberdeen and Premier Laurier at Ottawa, is on his way to England, to participate in the diamond jubilee festivities. Mr. Seddon is a strong Liberal, and New Zealand is the most advanced colony in the British Empire. They have woman suffrage there, and the system has worked well. The distinguished visitor has worked his way to the top by sheer force of character. He is the son of an English schoolmaster, who went to New Zealand in search of employment. He went to work as a miner, became secretary of the miners' union, took a strong interest in local affairs, and was sent to Parliament as a representative worker. His influence grew steadily till he attained the undisputed leadership of the party which now holds the government of the interesting colony.

There Must Be Apprenticeships.

The American Foundrymen's Association, which has been holding profitable sessions in Detroit this week, has says the Free Press of that city, done the various branches of the craft a most important and substantial service by adopting the well-considered report of the committee appointed to take up the matter of apprenticeships.

After a thorough discussion of the question, the contention being more over details than anything else, the representative gathering put itself almost unanimously on record as favoring the indenturing of lads to their employers for a reasonable period at moderate wages, to the end that their preparation for the foundry trade might be such as to constitute them competent, full-fledged craftsmen. The enforcement of such a system which is found to have a marked effect not only upon the foundrymen's calling, but upon all industrial vocations, was declared to be not alone desirable, but an absolute necessity, if the standard of the art is to be maintained and the various branches kept up to a high degree of efficiency.

Under the classification approved by the convention, boys taking up the department of machinery molding must serve an apprenticeship of four years, in stove plate and agricultural implements molding be put in three years, in bench and brass molding two years. If the apprentice has had the advantage of training in technical schools, the term of service is to be modified according to his educational equipment. The duties and compensations are also to be made to comport with the advanced apprentice's qualifications.

In the first class mentioned the

age limit was fixed at 16 and 18, and in the second class at 17 and 19, no restrictions being placed upon apprentices of the third class or of the technically educated group. Bonuses of \$100, \$75 and \$50 for the first three classes respectively were left undetermined, it being a matter that depends largely upon local conditions. A probation period of eight weeks is required before the beginner can be indentured, and his aptitude being demonstrated in that time, it is held that the compulsory duration of service will equip the youth for a career of usefulness and efficiency in the art.

The revival of the apprenticeship system by such an important industrial body as the foundrymen of America will be hailed with satisfaction by those proud and painstaking master workmen, and by employing foundrymen, as well, who have held that a great number of incompetent, slipshod and thriftless workmen of all trades and callings was due largely to the decline of a rigid system of preparation. Young men have been allowed to remain in a foundry or shop long enough to get a smattering of one branch of the business and have then gone forth feeling that they were competent craftsmen, an illusion soon dispelled when they were called upon to assume some exacting and responsible task. If a lad is bound to be a molder, if the ambition possesses all his thoughts and energies, he will not lose his enthusiasm in an apprenticeship of from two to four years. If he does, the craft is better off without him, for his aversion to proper preparation will prove his incompetency.

More and more the demand will be for competent, experienced, well-trained craftsmen in all lines as civilization advances. The apprenticeship system requiring the novice to work his way up from an humble beginning and to master every detail as he goes along, and stimulating him to do his best by a graded course of compensation and responsibilities, is calculated to furnish the kind of men which the times will demand.

All Are Interested in Canada.

Canada is occupying a good deal of the attention of Australians these days, and a considerable number of them will take the C. P. R. steamship and rail route to and through this country to Great Britain on the occasion of her Majesty's jubilee. Among others who will be in Canada this year is Hon. Geo. H. Reid, Premier of New South Wales, who has many admirers in Canada. Mr. Reid is one of the ablest men in the colonies, and a leader in the movement for the federation of Australia. He is a pronounced advocate of trade freedom, and he has been instrumental in passing the freest tariff ever adopted by an English-speaking people. Still another visitor to Canada, is Lady Hampton, wife of the governor of New South Wales, and suite, who also take the popular C. P. R. route. Australian commercial men in various lines will also visit the Dominion on the outward or homeward trip, with the object of looking up trade. That business can be profitably conducted between the two countries is proved by the results of the enterprise of those Canadians who are now sending their wares down the Pacific. Of the condition of affairs, the Australian correspondent of the Monetary Times has the following:

"The last Canadian steamer brought over the largest cargo of Canadian goods and produce that has hitherto been landed here. For the first time, every pound of flour on board was Canadian. The market has been over-supplied with California wheat and prices have fallen. Prices of Manitoba flour have fallen, in keeping with the general reduction, but still it is in good demand at higher figures than any other. Under the name of Manitoba flour various mixtures are being put on the market, injuring thereby the good name of the brand.

Mr. McBride, one of the directors of the Massey-Harris Company, has been investigating the possibilities of trade in the colonies. It is probable that the examination and defense of a larger trade in agricultural machinery from Canada, and an increase in the variety of goods sent here, Mr. Patterson, lately the company's manager in the Maritime Provinces of Canada, has come out to take the management here. A small parcel of Ontario salmon trout has been sold at good prices. It was well received and more was asked for, but it could not be got in time for Lent. Next year it may become an item of export from Canada.

"Among the passengers leaving by the Aorangi, on May 10, will be Lieut. Col. Sir Frederick Sargood, of Melbourne. Sir Frederick is head of the largest wholesale drygoods firms (for he has houses in the different colonies) in Australia. His firms are large buyers of Canadian prints and cottons and other Canadian goods. He is a member of the Legislative Council of Victoria, and was a member of the Government of that colony from 1880 to 1892. When in office he reorganized the militia and defense of Victoria, and still takes a very active part in military affairs. He will stay a short time in Toronto and some of the other cities, where he should be heartily welcomed as a friend to Canada and Canadian trade."

The trade of the Dominion, under the improved conditions, bids fair to be largely extended in the next few years. Merchants and manufacturers can best promote their interests by studying the demands of the markets, and when they find a suitable field for operations, promptly cultivating it. Some people seem to forget that success chiefly depends upon the humoring of the fancies of customers.

The Two Emperors and Their White Elephant.

As might have been expected, the Turks are disinclined to leave Greece, now that they have been victorious, unless they get their pound of flesh.

The sultan wants a large sum of money, the big territory of Thessaly, and numerous other advantages, as an indemnity from Greece. If he does not get what he wants, this Master Turk threatens to make trouble. The two emperors, who have stood at his back in the resistance of the claim of the Cretans to be joined to Greece, and cast their lot with the Mohammedans, may not appreciate these arrogant demands, but, as the late Boss Tweed asked, so now asks the Turkish Sultan, "What are you going to do about it?" Unless they are prepared to go to war to coerce Turkey into withdrawing her claims on Greece, and unless Greece herself agrees to these humiliating terms, the conquest of this Christian nation by the Mohammedan power may be continued to the bitter end. It may happen that the powers will not be able to agree on the course which Turkey ought to pursue, and will separate. If that is the outcome, Turkey will find herself, for the first time in nearly 50 years, really independent and correspondingly defiant. And the last condition of the Christian subjects of the sultan will be worse than the first. The outlook is not at all reassuring.
