Sir Wilfrid Laurier At Toronto

Immense Demonstration in Honor of the Premier.

Massey Hall Filled and Two Other Great Gatherings Addressed by Members of the Government—Torchlight Procession of 4,000 Men—Half a Dozen Cabinet Ministers and Two Score Members of Parliament in Attendance.

Toronto, Oct. 17.—The demonstration in honor of Sir Wilfrid Laurier last night probably exceeded anything of this kind that Toronto had ever previously seen, if, indeed, it did not surpass anything in Canadian history.

The features of the jubilation were a vast torchlight procession, with four thousands men in line, and three huge meetings each addressed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and several of his colleagues.

Massey Music Hall, holding alone five thousand people, overflowed in a few minutes, and the hundreds of newcomers at that hour were met by hundreds of others turning away to hasten to the overflow meetings in the Pavilion and in Association Hall, which, too, were speedily filled to the doors.

Several other halls could easily have been filled with the crowd of disappointed ones eager to hear the eloquent premier.

Many hundreds of people had come in from the country during the day, and most of these were among the vast crowd that by 6 o'clock was awaiting the opening of the doors. The doors were opened a few minutes before half-past 6 o'clock, and there was a terrific rush and crush, filling every corner of the vast hall within a quarter of an hour.

Two score Liberal members of parliament and as many candidates for honors at the approaching elections came to the city to honor the great premier, and Sir Wilfrid was accompanied by half a dozen members of his cabinet.

With him were Sir Richard Cartwright, the veteran of so many campaigns; Mr. Mulock, whose achievements as postmaster-general have given him an imperial reputation; Mr. Fielding, whose magnificent surplus of \$5,000,000 for the current year is the last item to add to his brilliant financial record; Mr. Patterson, the able minister of customs, one of the old guard of Liberalism; and Hon. James Sutherland, the genial and popular representative of Western Ontario.

The occasion was a gigantic ovation, a marvelous tribute to the personal influence and the popularity of a man whose four years of power have been the most brilliant page in the history of Canada—that Canada which Sir Wilfrid loves with such passionate fervor, as was ever and again made manifest in his splendid oratory of last night.

The rapidity with which the hall filled up on the opening of the doors was simply incredible. The people swept through the various doors in hurried streams, the men leaping and jumping to get possession of good seats. The ladies, while not so agile, were quite as eager, with the result that the hall, which a few moments before looked like a vast, empty cave, was as if by magic peopled with row upon row of human faces. Such a scene may have been witnessed before, but while there were no people, men, women and children who may be described as veterans in their experience of public meetings, not one of them had ever seen an empty hall in such a manner burst into life as it at the touch of an enchanted wand. When Roderick Dhu whistled, the poet tells us,

"That whistle garrisoned the glen
 At once with full five hundred men."

If "thousand" be substituted for "hundred" some idea will be afforded of the multiplied apparition that, as in the twinkling of an eye, transformed Massey Hall last night.

There was necessarily a long wait before the speaking could begin, but provision had been made, so that time would not hang heavily on their hands. The Cadets' Brass Band, a string band and the Laurier Quartet maintained a succession of cheerful sounds, to which the multitude listened and alternately cheered. It was well past 8 before the hum of a countless throng without dominated even the sound of the drum and trumpet within, and the glow of torches and flashing of rockets through the great windows announced that he for whom all were waiting was at hand. In a very few minutes thereafter Canada's premier, preceded by a herald carrying the Union Jack, came through the center door of the proscenium.

A STIRRING SCENE

It was the moment for which the magnificent assemblage was awaiting. Like one man they sprang to their feet. Some had provided themselves with the nation's flag, and everyone at least had a handkerchief, and instantly the hall was converted into a fluttering garden of colors, rising like above their almost electric lights in the dome. The sea-like roar that burst from five thousand throats was maintained without cessation, or even break, until one thought that they had no intention of bringing the remarkable ovation to a close. When at length the audience was disposed to listen, Mr. G. G. S. Lindsey, the chairman, after a few preliminary words, introduced one af-

ter the other the local candidates of the Liberal party.

THE PREMIER.

It must be frankly admitted that the audience was impatient for its idol, and was not disposed to listen to anyone else until it had heard from him. When he was introduced by the chairman there was a repetition of the reception at his entrance, modified by the desire to hear the sweet, grave, heart-felt accents in which he thanked them for their unprecedented welcome of him.

At his first word the vast multitude settled into silence so absolute that even the low tones of the opening passage penetrated to every portion of the spacious auditorium. This silence was unbroken save by the quick and sympathetic responses which his eloquent periods evoked.

THE SPEECH.

The speech was beautifully balanced, beginning with an appeal to the reason of his hearers, and gradually growing to the noble close in which he appealed to their patriotism, adjuring them to bend their every energy to effect and perpetuate that perfect union of the Canadian people which was the aim and aspiration of his life. It was, indeed, a meeting which every Canadian took part in it will remember as one of the most notable events in which they were ever privileged to participate.

SCENE IN THE HALL.

People began to gather outside Massey Hall as early as 3 o'clock. Their numbers grew rapidly, until the waiting crowd stretched across the street and blocked all the approaches. All these people had brought their lunches with them in order to be at the hall early. At 6:30 the doors were opened, and within five or ten minutes every available seat was occupied, except the top gallery, where the space was reserved for university students. Not only was all the seating accommodation speedily exhausted, but all the aisles and the space to right and left of the platform were jammed with people. Freshmen arriving at 6:40 and entering by the stage entrance, adjured them to fight their way through a dense mob in order to reach the reporters' table.

At 7 o'clock nothing was to be seen but a dense sea of faces, and not an inch of space was unoccupied. It was a wonderful and impressive sight, and nothing like it has ever been witnessed before in this city.

WHILE WAITING.

While waiting for the meeting to begin the novel sight was seen of hundreds of people eating the lunches they had brought with them. The band of the Public School Cadets, attired in khaki uniforms, beguiled the time by performing a number of popular airs. Most of the tunes were recognized by the audience, and thunders of applause rewarded the performance. "The Maple Leaf" was an especial favorite, and elicited an extra round of plaudits. "Soldiers of the Queen"
