THE TORONTO CUP. Toronto, Ont., May 26.—Wm. Hendrie's 4-year-old Martimas, winner of the Futurity in 1938, and a candidate for this year's Suburban, made his first appearance of the season in the Toronto cup, the feature event of the card at Woodbine Park this afternoon.

From his showing today, Martimas looks to be a much-improved horse over last year. He ran a good race in a fighting finish won by a neck from Procession. Ballard, who was up on the Hendrie horse, rode a well-judged race. Although he made his own race, Martimas was kept within himself by his rider, who held something in reserve for a final effort at the end. The race was for 3-year-olds and upward, at a mile and a quarter, and seven of the thirteen carded in the feature.

Martimas carried 129, and was conceding weight to everything in the race. He was always the choice, and was well played by his stable. When the flag fell he quickly shot to the front, but before he had gone a sixth of a mile he was being ridden by Alice Farley. The pair ran head and head down the back stretch until rounding the far turn, when the mare dropped back, beaten. Turning into the straight, Martimas had a wide lead of a length and a half, and looked like an easy winner. Procession, which Lewis had gradually worked up to the leaders, made his run in the last eighth. Under a vigorous ride he got to Martimas at the stretch pole, but hung there, and could not get his nose ahead of Ballard's mount. Ballard also won on the Provost, with Lewis on the one that got the place.
