The prisoners have been discontented on acprisoners have been discontented on ac-count of the poor quality and meagre quantity of rations allowed them, and they have had other grievances. The prisoners made a wreck of the place, burning the furniture and bedding and working all the destruction they could. The military finally quelled the disturbance.

Low Prices for EnglishWheat. LONDON, April 3 .- The Mark Lane Ex press, in its weekly review of the grain trade, eays: "April begins with English trade, says: "April begins with English wheat at 25 shillings, the lowest price on record. The average price obtained during March was profoundly discouraging. Although the granary reserves have fallen 700,000 quarters since New Year's Day, yet prices have receded 10 pence, with no recovery. The imported wheat supply affoat amounts to 2.890,000 quarters."

The Lily Gets a "Little."

LONDON, April 3.-Mrs. Langtry made no secret of her expectations from the death of "Squire" Abington. The two had been very good friends, and Baird had made all sorts of promises to her, but all his money, something like \$250,000 a year, goes to his mother, and Mrs. Langtry, shrewd business woman as she is, is left out in the cold. Not altogether out, however, for before his death Baird made over to her the house in Chelsea, where she lives when in London, and all its furniture. The house rents for \$5,000 a year, and the furniture is new and worth about \$50,000. The yacht White Lady, in which Mrs. Langtry has been cruising in the Mediterranean, is also hers. This cost \$170,000 a little while ago, so the "Lily" doesn't fare so badly after all.

Bering Sea Arbitration.

Bering Sea Arbitration.

LONDON, April 4.—The newspapers generally comment upon the introduction of documents before the Court of Arbitration regarding Bering Sea of the British counter case, exposing the use made of mistranslations of Russian documents in the case presented by the United States. The British contention, the Standard adds, is

presented by the United States. The British contention, the Standard adds, is that when spurious passages are expunged there does not remain an atom of evidence supporting the chief American allegations. The St. James Gazette says it does not suspect the United States Government of conniving in the concosted passages, and is aure that the American people will repudiate a trick so dirty and so silly. Yet, adds the Gazette, the arguments founded on the torgeries are uncanceled.

A Washington dispatch says the news as to false and garbled translations of Russian documents in the case as originally prepared for the United States in the Bering Sea controversy is very old on this side of the water. The State Department discovered that Ivan Potroff, a special agent employed to obtain data on this seal matter, had been deliberately fabricating alleged facts and garbling documents, and he was promptly dismissed and the garbled documents replaced by accurate translations. It is said at the department that no part of the argument of the United States is founded upon the fabrications thus canceled.

THE PATRONS' PROGRESS. Good Outlook for the Order in Eastern Ontario.

Lockie Wilson, grand trustee of the Patrons of Industry of Ontario is in Montreal negotiating with dealers for the supply of Liverpool salt to all the associations of Eastern Ontario. He expects to have a large number of carloads shipped in the next few weeks. Mr. Wilson declares the Patrons of Industry are rapidly increasing in numbers. The work of extending the order in the Province of Quebec has commenced. Associations have been started in the Eastern Townships and are meeting with success. The constitution is being translated into French and it is expected the association will soon be as strong in Quebec as in Ontario.
