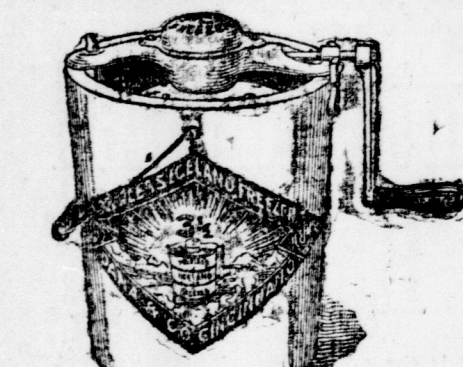

FIRST DAY AT RACE MEETING

Keenly Contested Events at Queen's Park Track.

Track Was Fast Yesterday and the Attendance Unusually Large.

A cloudless sky, a good track, and an excellent field of entries were the auspicious conditions which marked the opening yesterday of the June meeting of the London Turf Club. Lovers of the noble horse turned out in force and the grand stand was occupied by a crowd of probably 1,000 men, including many of London's prominent well-known citizens. Probably half as many of the fair sex were in attendance, and they manifested a keen interest in the various events. The excellent sport provided by the club and the promising character of the first day's racing should insure doubled crowds for the remaining two days of the meeting. The Musical Society Band, under Leader F. L. Evans, has been engaged to play each day during the meet.

A. W. McElroy, of Chicago, was again present to officiate as starter. Mr. McElroy demonstrated his fitness for his position by the manner in which he impressed upon drivers the fact that fines would follow any unnecessary delay at the posts and any unfair work in getting away. As a result, the starts were good and little time was wasted.

The other officials, all well known to London horsemen, are Messrs. James McGregor (Lambeth), John O'Flaherty (London), and J. D. Lowrey (Sarnia); timekeepers, Messrs. Geo. Gordon and J. D. Lowrey; and the judge (Lambeth); clerk of the course, A. D. Holman (London); weighing clerk, W. Hyman.

Two bookmakers did business at the southern end of the grand stand, and they were well patronized. A wheel of fortune also kept rolling all afternoon and many patrons tried their luck.

The first race was the 2:35 pace, for which there were seven entries, and six starters, four of which were in the final heat. Little Fred won the first two heats easily, but the driver of Billy A., who had finished second in each heat, was taken down, and Driver Kennedy, of Walkerton, given the seat on the sulky. The change was a wise one, for the next two heats fell to Billy A. Little Fred taking the place. In the final heat Little Fred finished first, but he was set back to second for repeated breaking, and the heat and race were awarded to Billy A. The only London horse, Vivian Wilkes, owned by Robert Reid, was unable to do better than fifth in two heats, and in the third he was distanced—a fate that Bobby Mack narrowly escaped.

The first heat of this race was marked by a bay gelding, owned by the Thames Valley stables, of Thamesford, who was the favorite, and who made the turn at the south end of the track he broke badly. His driver endeavored to steady the horse, but was unsuccessful. After making half a mile, the animal was pulled so hard that it choked and fell into the fence near the horse barns. The driver drove out of the sulky in time to make the seat two feet of the fence was torn away, but the horse and sulky escaped damage. Ben Coyne, 99, owned by T. Fitzgerald, Toronto, was entered for this race and drawn.
