WHAT U. S. ARMY LACKS

Annual Report of Lieutenant-General Miles—Incomplete Defenses.

Washington, Nov. 7.—The annual report of Lieutenant-General Miles, commanding the United States army, is a brief review of the reports that have been submitted to him by other officers. He indorses the recommendation of Gen. Brooke for a readjustment of the geographical limits of the different departments, with a view of equalizing conditions. Gen. Miles calls attention to the necessity of quarters for troops, saying that while hundreds of thousands of dollars are being spent for quarters for cavalry, very little is being used for shelter for artillery, which is exposed to severe climates along the coast. Gen. Miles says: "I will also mention the incomplete condition of the fortifications, especially on the Pacific coast, where millions have been expended in engineering and ordnance work, and yet the commands have not been properly supplied with ammunition, electric plants and other appliances essential to the effective use of these fortifications in actual warfare."

Grand Trunk Extension.

Montreal, Nov. 7.—It was admitted by a high G. T. R. official yesterday that the Grand Trunk and the Toledo, St. Louis and Western Railway shortly will acquire joint control of the Detroit and Toledo Jointway, all the financial arrangements having been completed. This, it is stated, will be a valuable acquisition for the G. T. R.

BURIED CITY UNCOVERED

Interesting Work of Explorers in Palestine.

Gezer's Inhabitants Were Slain by Joshua, Leader of the Hebrews.

Chicago, Nov. 6.—A London cable to the Tribune says: The quarterly statement of the Palestine exploration fund has a paper by Prof. Macalister which marks almost a new departure in Palestine archaeology. It describes excavations at Tel-el-Jezari, on the right of the road from Jaffa to Jerusalem. The site was identified as Gezer, the Canaanite city, the king and people of which were slain by Joshua.

The excavation revealed four series of ancient walls and four layers of strata which, putting aside the buildings of later date, mark the site of the city as occupied by four different sets of inhabitants.

The first and second layers were not always distinguishable. There were three unknown monoliths, 14 feet high, with smaller ones between, and under an adjoining pavement were found jars containing the charred bones of infants, which would seem to indicate that it was a place where children passed through the fire to some predecessor of Moloch.

Two caves were discovered. One, dating from the 14th century, was covered with a layer sometimes a foot deep of human ashes and bones, which often had been imperfectly consumed.

STORM ON ALASKA COAST

Many Vessels Grounded on the Nome Beach.

Eight Persons Perished—Terrible Experience of a Crew.

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 7.—No less than eight men were drowned, three vessels driven ashore and practically every lighter on the Nome beach was wrecked in a storm that commenced on Tuesday, Oct. 14, and continued throughout the day. The facts are supplied by Purser Robertson, of the Ohio, who arrived today. The known dead are: Frank Kelly, George Robertson, George Fleuth and Samuel Josephson. A dozen or more people thrown into the surf were rescued by the life-saving crew. The schooner Louise, the steamer Elk, and the launch Fleet Wing were among the larger craft left on the beach. In each instance the crews were rescued or managed to reach the shore. The storm caused the water to back up in Snake River and Dry Creek and Dry Creek bridge was washed away.

PERILS OF THE DEEP.

New York, Nov. 6.—Capt. Kay and wife and nine seamen, the crew of the British bark Florence B. Edgett, which they abandoned in mid-ocean, Oct. 15, after she was dismantled by a hurricane and waterlogged, arrived here today on the steamer Fremont from Trinidad. The vessel, left River, N. S., Aug. 13, for Buenos Ayres, with a cargo of lumber. On Oct. 15, she was caught in a hurricane. Every effort was made to keep her afloat, but vainly. The crew worked night and day until Oct. 15, when the vessel was abandoned. The crew was rescued by the launch Fleet Wing. The storm caused the water to back up in Snake River and Dry Creek and Dry Creek bridge was washed away.

WAS NO FRENCH AFFAIR

Duelists Fired Eleven Shots—Each Man Was Killed.

Michigan Man Fatally Shot in a Drunken Quarrel.

Grandin, Mo., Nov. 7.—Jas. Barrow and Marlon Dun engaged in a duel with pistols on the streets here yesterday as the result of which both men were killed. Eleven shots were exchanged at short range, eight taking effect. The men, both of whom were of the Michigan nationality, were found dead in the street. The cause of the duel was a difference over election matters, but there had been bad blood between the men for several years.

FATAL QUARREL.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Nov. 6.—Navy and Marine were killed in a murder near Gatesville. It appears that M. Isaacson and a man named Dahl, both Finlanders, started from Cedarville yesterday afternoon for Hossack's camp. Both had been drinking, and an altercation arose which soon resulted in blows. Dahl fired his gun and shot Isaacson. Dahl then fled. When Isaacson was found, he lived only long enough to tell that much. Sheriff Swart and deputies are out searching for the murderer.

BRUTALLY ASSAULTED.

Ottawa, Nov. 7.—J. B. Renaud, of Hull, was brutally assaulted by a man named Michael Ryan and his wife, unconscious condition with very doubtful prospects for recovery. Ryan has been arrested and remanded to wait the result of the injuries to his victim.

The new Chicago budget estimates the revenue at \$129,000,000 and the expenditures at \$131,000,000.

The Minnesota Harvester Company has been incorporated at St. Paul, Minn., with a capital of \$6,000,000.

Small consignments of anthracite coal have reached Ottawa since the strike. It is selling at \$8.50 per ton.

The grand jury at Winnipeg, Man., in the case of King vs. Mueller, charged with murder, returned a bill.

A Winnipeg dispatch says the harvesters are making their way home in Ontario, where homes are in the east.

The wholesale millinery firm of J. W. Pennock & Co., No. 44 Yonge street, after being reported to be in financial difficulties, and offering to compromise with creditors.

This has been the most prosperous year in the Brantford has had in the construction of buildings. There have been permits granted for buildings to the amount of \$70,000.

Thomas C. Mitchell, injured by falling from a building at the Toronto Exhibition, died yesterday.

He was 40 years of age and leaves a wife and three children.

The Montreal harbor commissioners revenue from navigation opening to the end of October was \$240,000, compared with \$196,446 for same period last year, or an increase of \$43,554.

Clara Grundy, ex-bookkeeper for Thomas Hynes & Sons, coal dealers, Hamilton, was committed for trial on a charge of stealing money and postage stamps from his employers.

The corner stone of the new convocation hall of Queen's University, Kingston, was on Thursday laid by Sir Sandford Fleming, chancellor of Queen's, in the presence of a large assembly.

George Vest, jun., son of Senator Vest, of Missouri, was found dead in his room at a Washington hotel Thursday morning. Mr. Vest, for a number of years, had acted as private secretary to his father.

Ex-Ald. W. H. Gibbs, of Toronto, died, aged 79 years. He and his brother, John Gibbs (deceased), represented North and South for several years as Conservatives, under Sir John A. Macdonald.

Rev. F. French, of Tweed, says that crime is on the decline in the vicinity of Acushnet, Hastings County, that law-abiding people will be compelled to take away unless some steps are taken to better enforce the law.

Edward L. Rossiter has been elected treasurer of the New York Central and Hudson River Railway Company, to succeed the late Samuel Prince. The new treasurer is a son of E. V. W. Rossiter, vice-president of the road.

At the chief game warden's office, Toronto, 401 licenses for the shooting of deer have been issued to date, as compared with a total of 348 last year. The indications are that there is a corresponding increase all over the province.

The directors of the Manitoba and Northwest Loan Company, which some time ago decided to wind up, yesterday reported to the shareholders that the holders for 50 per cent of their holdings. They expect to pay considerably more.

The Philippine commission has taken strong measures to avert the rice famine, which is threatening many provinces. They appropriated \$2,000,000 for the purchase and transportation of rice to be sold to the sufferers at a cash price covering the cost.

A burglar entered the residence of C. A. Fay, editor of the Clinton, Iowa, Standard, and stole a watch and a ring from under Fay's head, after lighting the gas, compelled Fay and his wife to give him money and diamonds valued at \$1,200. The robber escaped.

Leave will be given for a trial in the case of Frank Higgins, the boy sentenced to death for the murder of Willie Doherty, at St. John, N. B., previous to the execution, before the supreme court on application for a new trial on Tuesday next.

A committee has been appointed to report at the next regular weekly meeting of the grain section of the Toronto Board of Trade regarding the fixing of grain standards for exports via Portland and via New York. Twenty-four grades have been fixed by the Portland route and twelve by the New York route.

The railway company have agreed to the city's terms regarding the six-day clause for their workmen, and the council will meet shortly to further consider the bylaw and prepare it for submission to the ratepayers on election day.
