Into a Hard Knot

Strathroy. July 31. - The Grand shipping in a hard knot. Our merchants and manufacturers and live stock dealers, at great inconvenience, are sending their shipments via C. P. R., draymen making daily trips to Caradoc station, six miles distant. Only package freight is moving, and the quantity may be judged from the fact that only three small cars have left the local station during the past ten

This does not include carload lots, perishable freight or live stock, none of which the company will accept. Drovers have had to drive their herds and even as far as Walker's station, a distance of 12 miles.

The loss of the Grand Trunk can be estimated from the fact that no less than from 6 to 8 cars of cattle, etc., are usually shipped from here on Saturdays. Komoka, to the east, and Kerwood, to the west, nearby G. T. R. stations, are exceptionally good shipping points, and also do a brisk busi-

Strathroy has half a dozen big manufacturing plants, some of which make carload shipments every day or so, and their business is being seriously interfered with.

It was reported yesterday that one furniture factory, employing over 600 hands, would have to close down shortly unless it could get rid of the vast quantity of goods that have accumulated and are waiting shipment. It is almost safe to say that with the exception of very small truck, everything is going via the C. P. R., which is having quite a time to provide for accommodation for the rush.

The Grand Trunk here will receive only shipments for points between Sarnia on the west and Toronto and

Suspension Bridge on the east. Strathroy is one of the best naving stations on the Grand Trunk system for its size, and under normal conditions upwards of a score of full cars are picked up here every week. Your correspondent learned last night, from reliable sources, that the company's freight business has been virtually decimated by the strike. The town and surrounding country are certainly feel-
