The seeding and growing season for the whole of Canada has opened late this year, and the month of April has been marked by hard frosts. But May has been favorable to cultivation of the land and the rainfall has been sufficient for healthy vegetation.

Fall wheat, which is grown chiefly in Ontario and Alberta, showed an average condition of \$2 per cent. at the end of April, being \$0 per cent in Alberta and \$1 per cent in Ontario. In Ontario, however, the April frosts were destructive in some regions, and from 12 to 34 per cent of the area sown has been reported as winter-killed. 
