"DOC" COOK SAYS HE CAN COME BACK

Will Show Up Peary as Fakir, Declares North Pole "Discoverer."

Chicago, Sept. 1.—Dr. Frederick A. Cook announced here today his plan to prove to the world that he was the first and only discoverer of the north pole.

The international geological congress, sitting tremulously in Rome, Italy, in October, will hear Dr. Cook's case, he says, and pass voluminous data he has to offer.

Dr. Cook has not challenged Rear Admiral Robert M. Peary to be present at the Rome congress, but has requested him to be present.

The explorer said the revelations he will make to the congress in Rome will "startle the world."

"The matter I shall present to the international congress will have to be answered sooner or later by Peary," said Dr. Cook, at the Congress Hotel, "but I do not believe he will be very eager about replying to it. I am quite convinced that the data I shall present will mean the relegation of Mr. Peary to the background as an Arctic explorer."

"I shall present elaborate scientific proof of my polar attainment and shall answer specifically every charge that Peary made against me."

"I shall show that the testimony to prove that I did not scale Mount McKinley was obtained by bribery, and I can state the amount and the person who paid it."

Dr. Cook will sail from New York for Italy on Oct. 1. The congress will begin its session about the middle of October.

WIFE OF MADERO WINS APPLAUSE

Nominating Convention in Mexico Goes Wild Over Heroine.

Mexico City, Sept. 1.—Shortly after noon Francisco I. Madero, for, appeared before the progressive convention to openly pledge himself to the platform on which he was nominated for the presidency of Mexico last night.

So great was the applause accorded to the nominee that it was nearly a delirium before he concluded his speech, in which he agreed to carry out the programme and work for all the principles included in his plan on which he conducted the revolution.

The speaker pledged himself to retire at the end of his presidential term.

Following Senor Madero's speech every member of the convention solemnly promised to work for his candidacy and to support the ticket regardless of the identity of the vice-president yet to be nominated.

In the balconies of the convention hall sat Senor Madero and the other members of Madero's family. In tribute to Senor Madero, who has accepted the nomination, the convention decided to name the vice-president.

Portugal and Church

The Law in Regard to Separation To Be Remodelled.

Lisbon, Sept. 1.—The Patriarch of Lisbon is authority for the statement that the Holy See has been advised of the probability of a complete remodeling of the law in Portugal concerning the separation of church and state and that Pope Pius has declared that if the remodeling is along liberal lines there will be no objection to the church accepting the law and resuming diplomatic relations with Portugal.

It is the first duty of these men to report all details they can get of the fortifications in the country to which they are assigned. All this information is eventually filed in the vaults of the general staff, and on it, to a large degree, depends the preparedness of the country for war.
