SUFFRAGETTE INVADERS MAY BE UNDESIRABLES

A Possibility That Immigration Regulations May Bar Them.

Ottawa, Sept. 12.—Is a militant suffragette an undesirable citizen within the meaning of the law? The suggestion that the warlike suffragettes, from England, be barred out of Canada under the terms of the regulation regarding undesirables has been made to the department of the interior, and the belief seems to prevail that the regulations would apply. The suggestion has special reference to the threatened invasion of votes-for-women leaders from across the ocean; and the fact that sundry of these ladies have served time in jail, and that their mission is the introduction of law-breaking methods into Canada would, it is urged, be sufficient to justify their exclusion.

The department, of course, will not be called upon to decide the point until the suffragettes themselves decide whether or not they are coming.

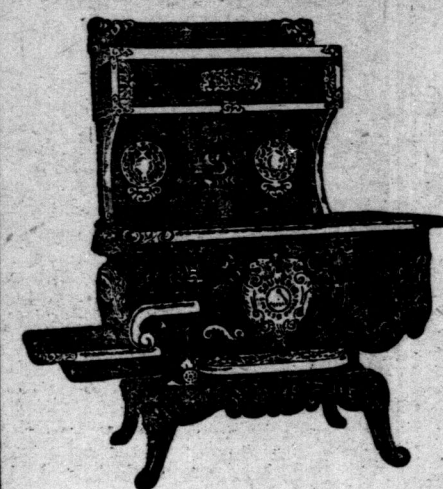
