HINTS AT CLOSURE BILL AS COMMONS ADJOURNS

Premier Borden Says Rules Will Be Amended Next Week.

STATEMENT BY THE GOVT.

Issue of Free Speech in Canadian Parliament is at Stake.

Ottawa, March 19.—"I cannot say at the present moment what we shall go on with when the House resumes on Tuesday next, but I will send an intimation to the leader of the Opposition later," said Premier Borden at the adjournment of the Commons this evening, over the Easter recess. Then, in response to a suggestion from Hon. H. R. Emmerson, that the Liberals would like to discuss the question as to the authority of Speaker Sproule for ordering the chairman of the committee on Saturday night last to shut off further discussion, both in regard to the limitation of debate, and in regard to the naval bill, the Premier declared that, as far as he knew at present, this would be the first order of business. The House then adjourned until Tuesday afternoon next.

Free Speech Issue.
 Behind the above brief announcement there lies an interesting story. Between the lines is summed up the position of the two parties at the present juncture in regard to the naval issue, and in regard also to the equally vital issue of free speech in Canada's Parliament. As a preliminary to the solving of the first issue there must first be solved the latter issue. That is the struggle which will first engage the attention of Parliament when it reassembles. On the naval issue, so far as the Liberal party is concerned, the position remains absolutely unchanged.

The fight will go on with even increased vigor and enthusiasm for a Canadian navy, manned, maintained, and built, as far as possible, in Canada, and under the control of the Canadian Parliament. Behind this is the whole issue of responsible government, of Canadian nationhood and of permanent imperial unity.

In regard to the constitutional right to free speech and the freedom of debate in Parliament under the present rules there is equal determination on the part of the Opposition to insist on their rights and to challenge on "the first opportunity to attempt to apply the gag through the unconstitutional action of Speaker Sproule and the

determined to prevent Parliament from exercising its usual normal functions.

"The present rules of the House being antiquated and out of date, readily lend themselves to the tactics which have been adopted by the Opposition during the past two weeks. Under these conditions, if the Opposition should persist in its determination to prevent the House from reaching a vote upon the bill it will be the clear course of the Government to press for amendments to the rules which, while securing all reasonable and necessary freedom of debate, will prevent persistent obstruction and will permit Parliament to provide for the public necessities and to proceed with the business of the country."

Rules Must Be Amended.
 "Notice of such amendments permitting debate to be brought to a conclusion after full but reasonable order paper next week. It is not the desire or intention of the Government to press these amendments through the House at present, if the Opposition will give any evidence or assurance of their willingness to accept the vote upon the bill to be taken within a reasonable time. If, however, they persist in defiant obstruction, the rules must be so amended that the proceedings of the House will not be reduced to a farce, and that the work of Parliament and the business of the country can be carried on and brought to a conclusion within a reasonable time and under reasonable conditions."

LIBERALS PROBING HYDRO ACCOUNTS

Commission Paid Construction Co. \$86,650 Over the Estimates.

ENGINEER GABEY CALLED

Major Pope, Secretary of the Commission, Gives Evidence Before Committee.

Toronto, March 20.—Deep and wide is the investigation which the Opposition will make into the accounts of the hydro-electric commission. The session of the public accounts committee yesterday morning was taken up entirely with figures concerning the McGowan contract for the construction of the Niagara transmission line. Engineers' certificates to the number of 225 were submitted to the scrutiny of Mr. Rowell and his lieutenants. At the end of the sitting a motion was made for the attendance of Mr. E. A. Gabey, chief engineer of the commission; Prof. Murray, of Ann Arbor, Mich., a sub-contractor, and Mr. F. H. McGowan.

Major W. W. Pope, secretary of the hydro-electric power commission, was the only witness examined. He spoke tranquilly during the whole proceeding. The evidence furnished goes to show that the original contract made for 233 miles of line, but the commission had power to add or take away from the mileage. The result was that 16 miles of the line were built by another contracting firm, a relay system was added to the McGowan contract, and when the time for settlement came an extra claim for \$142,000 was put in. Mr. P. W. Sothman, then chief engineer of the commission, made deductions from the portion of the line the company did not build, and issued a certificate for \$31,063. The claim went to arbitration, but, on the recommendation of Mr. Justice Tuck, a settlement was reached for \$85,592.

"The net result of the settlement of the McGowan claim," suggested Mr. Rowell, "was that the construction company was granted \$86,650 in excess of the estimate made by Mr. E. W. Sothman, your engineer."

"I can't say as to that," replied Mr. Pope.

"Well, is it not true that after the engineer's estimate of \$31,063 was paid to the company there was a further payment of \$86,650?"

"Yes," answered Mr. Pope.

A. O. U. W. RATES ARE STILL UNDECIDED

Eight Different Scales Were Presented Yesterday to Delegates at Toronto.

Toronto, March 19.—The first day of the 38th annual convention of the Ancient Order of United Workmen has practically decided nothing as to what will be done regarding the rate question.

Eight different scales were presented tonight to the members, and a trial vote was taken. The proposition that almost gained the favor of the majority was that which was presented at the last annual convention at Guelph.

This schedule has been the cause of much trouble. As soon as it was announced at the Guelph convention it met with strenuous opposition by the older members of the order, who had paid in for 25 or 30 years, and the convention divided. The bylaw carried, however, and the Guelph people were specially interested brought an action before Justice Riddell at Osgoode Hall, when his lordship ruled that such drastic increase in the rate should not be made until every member of the order had been notified and

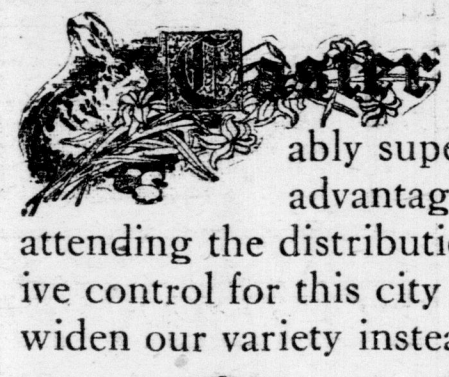

PLUNGED INTO THE DON

Toronto Bridge.

Toronto, March 19.—A motorcyclist plunged through a hole in the Gerrard street bridge this morning into the Don River. He was flung out none the worse for his experience.

BUFFALO SERGEANT SHOT

Insane Man Discharges Four Bullets Into Policeman's Body.

Buffalo, N. Y., March 19.—Joseph Stefanski, supposedly insane, entered the mayor's office in the city hall at 2 o'clock this afternoon and shot Charles E. Lang, a desk sergeant in the police department, who has been on detail to aid in the collection of licenses. Lang was hit four times—in the throat, shoulder-blade, the right side of his chest, and the left side. None of the wounds, it is thought, will prove fatal.

Stefanski was overpowered and beaten to subjection. There were cuts in his head sufficient to require that he be sent to the Emergency Hospital, after which he was locked up at the police headquarters on an open charge pending the outcome of Lang's wounds.

TWO MEN KILLED BY TRAIN AT HAMILTON

Step Aside to Board the Train and Are Hit by Another.

Hamilton, Ont., March 19.—Stepping from one track to avoid an eastbound freight train, to another, Wm. Askins, aged 20, married, of Toronto, and Thos. Sharpe, aged 22, single, of Peterboro, were struck by a westbound T. H. and B. freight engine, No. 62, on the main line of the T. H. and B., about a hun-

dred yards west of Garth street, about 9 o'clock last night, and instantly killed.

The matter was brought up today, and from the vote taken it is regarded as certain that it will pass tomorrow.
