One of Best-Known Physicians In Canada Writes of German Barbarities.

OFFICERS ARE MUTILATED

Belgians Children With Hands Off, and One Little Girl Had Eyes Gouged Out.

> The Advertiser has been show serving with one of the Canadlan base hospitals in France, in which he gives first-hand evidence of atrocities committed by German troops on Belgian children, and tells of the most horrible mutilation of British officers who have faller into the hands of the Germans. The Advertiser would hesitate to print further stories of atrocities were it not for the fact that the physician swears that WITH HIS OWN EYES HE HAS SEEN THE AND EXAMINED THEM. His letters came from the base hospital at Belfort to a reader of The Advertiser in Western Ontario, who is a well-known caple

talist. Unbelievable Atrocities. The physician states that many months he had heard the stories of outrages upon Belgian children, but that until he was given the opportunity of seeing some of the victims he could no believe that human beings could be guilty of such acts.

He went from the hospital at Belfort to a point two miles dis-There, two Belgian children were being cared for, ONE OF THEM, A BOY, HAS BOTH HANDS SEVERED AT THE WRIST, WHILE THE OTHER, A GIRL, HAD LOST THE SIGHT OF HER EYES, THROUGH SOME INSTRUMENT HAVING BEEN THRUST INTO THE OPTICS. Some Declaration.

The doctor makes a solemn de-claration in his letter that he saw these children, but that for some reason he is not permitted to make public the particulars. The man to whom he wrote said he would trust the physician as would trust himself, and that what he said could not be false. The second charge the doctor makes, and which he supports by first-hand evidence, is that the Germans have repeatedly mutilated British officers. Their object has been to exterminate as many of the fine types of the British race as possible. MANY OF THOSE OFFICERS.
