

PRaise of WILSON Germany's Latest

National Zeitung Expresses Great Admiration for U.S. Chief Executive.

FLATTERS HIM HIGHLY Sees Every Prospect of Settling Arabic Incident in Peaceful Way.

[Canadian Press.] Berlin, Sept. 1.—Via London, 11:20 a.m.—The National Zeitung publishes today a leading article under the heading "Wilson, Bryan and Roosevelt," which is noteworthy for its friendly tone and for the ungrudging admiration expressed for President Wilson. The article begins by saying that the American Government to delay action until Germany had had the opportunity of presenting its side of the case. Even the justice German newspapers admitted the justice of this request, the article says, and there now remains no obstacle to friendly discussions of differences which, while real, are by no means of such a nature as to prevent a satisfactory compromise. Difficult Position. The personality of President Wilson has been illuminated more strongly than ever before, the National Zeitung says, during the exciting days through which America has just passed. The President will appear to many in a new light. Never was his position more difficult than during the Arab incident. Mr. Bryan was calling on Americans for peace at any price, and Col. Roosevelt was summoning them to war against Germany. President Wilson is pictured in the article as standing between the two rivals, whose activities threatened to bring about such a situation that the President might make his attitude toward Germany dependent on domestic political considerations. Still Dissatisfied. "That President Wilson without this temptation and may be counted on to withstand it further must be acknowledged," the newspaper says, "notwithstanding the fact that the dissatisfaction with his attitude in the matter of submarine warfare."

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GERMANY WILL

FIFTY-FOUR BUSHELS TO ACRE IN ALBERTA

CALGARY, Aug. 31.—About forty per cent of the grain throughout the province is now cut, and threshing operations have begun in the south-west part of the province according to estimates made by the local men today. Some reports of almost freak yields are coming in from one farmer near Medicine Hat having just finished threshing thirty-six acres of wheat which yielded fifty-four bushels to the acre, the grain being threshed binder (twine) is being consumed at the rate of six pounds to the acre. Weather conditions were ideal today.

STATUE OF JUPITER FOUND IN AFRICAN CITY

Rome, Aug. 31, via Paris, Sept. 1.—Important archaeological discoveries have been made at the site of the ancient city of Cyrene, in the Bares region, Africa. These include a large statue of Jupiter, which is said to be equal in artistic value to the famous statue of Alexander the Great, discovered at the same place last year.
