Robinson Believes His Team Better Than Sox.

MARQUARD IN TOP FORM

Will Probably Pitch First Game in Brooklyn—One Big Wager.

[Canadian Press.] Brooklyn, N. Y., Oct. 5.—Wilbert Robinson, manager of the Brooklyn Nationals, will pitch his regular against New York in the game in Brooklyn this afternoon as a final workout for the opening of the world series at Boston on Saturday. "We are going out to win, and I think we can do it," said Robinson. "Our team has played good ball all season, and we held the lead almost all the way through, except for a day or two here and there. We measure up to the Red Sox, and with our team playing its best ball right now, there is no reason why it can't win. We'll show the fans some real playing. Marquard, Coombs, Cheney, Pfeffer and Smith will show them some pitching, and we are not worrying."

Marquard in Top Form. "Rube" Marquard, who is reported to have been selected to pitch the opening game for Brooklyn, said he was in top form now, and that Brooklyn is going to win. "This team has nothing to fear from Boston," he added. "We are sure right up to their standard in every department, and believe I hope is that I can pitch the same sort of ball that I have been pitching during the last couple of weeks."

Jack Coombs also expressed himself as confident of the outcome for Brooklyn. "If anyone believes Boston is going to ride over us he is making a big mistake."

One Big Wager. The first big wager here on the world series was announced today when it was stated that E. E. Smathers, the owner of fast horses, had placed \$20,000 to \$10,000 on the Boston Americans to win. A number of smaller wagers at 10 to 5 were reported.

It was announced that the four aces chosen for the world's series would be quiet to visit today to agree upon a uniform interpretation of rules. The "infield fly" is one point on which an agreement is desired, because in the American League a runner must hold his base on such a fly, while in the National League he can run at his own risk.

JEW PROTEST AGAINST PROPOSED DEPORTATION

Russian and Polish Refugees in England Not Keen for War.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Oct. 5.—A cablegram protesting against a reported attempt in the British House of Commons to deport Russian and Polish refugees from England unless they join the British army, was sent today to Sir Herbert Samuel, home secretary of England. The protest was the result of a mass meeting here last night called by the National Workmen's Committee on Jewish rights, which is said to represent 500,000 workers.

The cablegram sent to Mr. Samuel reads as follows: "The Jews are victimized practically now in all the warring countries, in Russia and in Austria, in Rumania, and in Turkey. It would be a great misfortune to the cause of humanity if England, the traditional land of freedom and democracy, should join the forces oppressing the Jews."

Dispatches from London in August stated that the British Government had proposed to enact a law to send to Russia the Russian and Polish Jews living in England unless they enlisted in the British army; but this aroused a storm of disapproval. A committee of leading Russian Jews was then organized to conduct an active recruiting campaign. An offer was to be made to Jews who enlisted before September 29 last to remit their naturalization fees and to organize them into a Jewish corps.

Light Workout For Carrigan's Champion Crew

Ten-Inning Game Is Puled Off on Brave's Field by Red Sox.

BOSTON, Oct. 4.—Manager Carrigan of the Boston Red Sox put his men through a light workout this afternoon on the Braves' field, where the world's series games in this city are to be played. The squad was divided into two teams, and ten innings were played. All the regular pitchers were sent in to work for an inning or two, and to get a feel of the field. The regulars were given plenty of opportunity to adjust to the conditions of the park.

Barry's Hand Still Weak. Capt. Barry was still hesitant in the game, but his injured hand is still weak, and it is not believed that he will figure in the world's series. Janvyn, who has been at second base in the past, is expected to play the position.

Tomorrow a team of Red Sox players will go to Worcester, where they will play a game with the Philadelphia American League team for the benefit of the memorial fund for John H. Gaffney, a former National League umpire. Press headquarters for the world's series will be opened at the Hotel Lenox in Boston Friday afternoon.

MORE RECORDS FALL AT LEXINGTON TRACK

Lee Axworthy Goes a Mile in 1:59 1-2 for New Mark.

ROAN HAL SHOWS SPEED

Lowers Pacing Gelding Record for the Season to 2:00 3-4.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Oct. 4.—One world's record and two season's records were broken at the third day's racing today of the Kentucky Horse Breeders' Association fall meeting. The world's record was broken when Lee Axworthy, 2:00, in an effort to break the track record of 2:03 for trotting stallions, made by Peter Volo last year, lowered his own world's record to 1:59 1/2.

Lucile Spier, the world's champion mare on a half-mile track, went to beat 2:05, and trotted the mile in 2:03 1/4, which is the season's mark for trotting mares, and Roan Hal, in winning the Board of Commerce stake for 2:00 pacers, went the second mile in 2:00 3/4, which is also the season's mark for pacing geldings.

All the races today were decided by straight heats. The results: Vaat Crowd Promised. Allotment of the 27,000 reserved seat tickets was finished early today, with probably more than 1,000 applications unanswered. The available reservations were over-subscribed so greatly that many persons who asked for a modest pair of seats were allowed but one, while others at least had come ahead of time, hoping to get the pick of seats. Hotelmen reported early indications of a tremendous business, requests for reservations having taxed the capacity in several instances to the point where extra seats were ordered installed.

The extent of the appeal of the world series as an event as widespread as interest as the name implies, was shown by requests to club and press officials. Many persons had sent inquiries from the battle front in France some weeks ago, from the Canadian Northwest by telegraph within the past week, and from Mexico. The committee in charge of press arrangements, reporting a greater demand for newspaper representation than ever before, said today that applications had come from Canada, Cuba and Panama.

KINGSTON LAWYER DEAD. KINGSTON, Oct. 4.—John McIntyre, K.C., for many years a prominent lawyer here and brother of D. M. McIntyre, chairman of the Ontario Railway Board, died today aged 73 years. He was born in Kingston, and was called to the bar over fifty years ago.

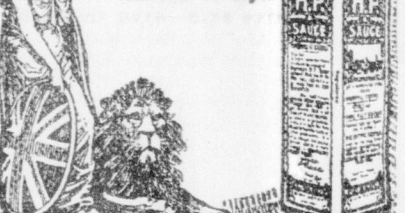

LEONARD WILL PITCH OPENER FOR RED SOX

Carrigan Will Likely Be Behind the Bat.

HUNDREDS OF FANS THERE

Reservations Are Over-Subscribed by Nearly Thousand Applications.

Boston, Oct. 5.—With the first game of the world series to be played in this city two days away, virtually every element in the local end of that event was in readiness today.

The world champion Boston Americans, marking time from the end of the season which brought them another pennant to the hour they meet the Brooklyn Nationals on Saturday in defence of greater baseball honors, divided forces. One group, headed by Capt. Jack Barry, went to Worcester to oppose the Philadelphia Americans in a game arranged to assist a memorial fund for the old-time napsie, John H. Gaffney. Others of the team went again to Braves Field, where the local games will be played, for light practice. Manager Carrigan, who was with the latter group, said that "the boys are in good shape, except for Foster and Barry." Whether either or both will be able to take an active part in the series was still uncertain, he said. Close followers of the team, chairman of the board, said that Carrigan himself would catch the opening game, with Leonard as the pitcher.

Allotment of the 27,000 reserved seat tickets was finished early today, with probably more than 1,000 applications unanswered. The available reservations were over-subscribed so greatly that many persons who asked for a modest pair of seats were allowed but one, while others at least had come ahead of time, hoping to get the pick of seats. Hotelmen reported early indications of a tremendous business, requests for reservations having taxed the capacity in several instances to the point where extra seats were ordered installed.

The extent of the appeal of the world series as an event as widespread as interest as the name implies, was shown by requests to club and press officials. Many persons had sent inquiries from the battle front in France some weeks ago, from the Canadian Northwest by telegraph within the past week, and from Mexico. The committee in charge of press arrangements, reporting a greater demand for newspaper representation than ever before, said today that applications had come from Canada, Cuba and Panama.

KINGSTON LAWYER DEAD. KINGSTON, Oct. 4.—John McIntyre, K.C., for many years a prominent lawyer here and brother of D. M. McIntyre, chairman of the Ontario Railway Board, died today aged 73 years. He was born in Kingston, and was called to the bar over fifty years ago.
