Red McKee's Aces Stage Rally in 8th When Quinn Is Wild and Split Series

Four Runs Came Across in This Session and Tees Couldn't Overcome the Mistake — Quinn Only Allowed Five Hits.

"Red" McKee's Aces staged an eighth-inning rally yesterday afternoon over at the London West ball lot, and before they could be stopped four runs had dusted across the plate, giving them a 5 to 3 win and an even division of the series.

"Lefty" Quinn hurled them from the south side, and only allowed five hits, but the last two in the eighth came while the bases were crowded on free passes, and one was a triple. Dodge, who twirled two innings the first day, took up where he left off, and while touched for eight healthy wallops, kept them far apart.

Another big crowd was on hand, and were chilled through, until the rally bobbed up in the eighth, and the Londoners put life into the pastime trying to regain the lost ground the next two frames, but without success. A high wind caused a lot of the wallops to pop high, and every ball that sailed out, to the outer works had something funny on it. Carmen, playing middle, starting with a one-handed stab in the first inning, had seven putouts to his credit, all of them curving or twisting.

Get a Pair.
The Tribe got a pair of runs off two knocks in the second frame. Kuhn singled, Shay walked, and both advanced on Crichtow's ground-out. Malmquist's single to left scored "Big Bill" and Shay. What looked like big things was abbreviated when Curry hit into a double play as second. Nothing happened in the third. Shay's double to left, which Kirby didn't see with his arm-glasses, in the fourth, no hits in the fifth, and one lone single in the sixth didn't make howling baseball.

In the seventh the Aces' infield started at an ascension, which promised some runs. Shay's double threw some sand into the gear-box, and then Crichtow was safe on a sacrifice hunt to Dodge, the long hurler fumbling the play. Malmquist came through with another sacrifice, and while they were working over big Walter at first, little Walter came galloping in from third and beat Murphy's throw to the plate by a fraction of a second.

Crichtow landed up at third when Dodge threw badly to second, and with Curry up, things looked rosy. Johnny Murphy stepped up in front right here, though, and grabbed the London backstop's hot liner down, and when Quinn ticketed one for the right garden Murphy went up into the air after it, and pulled it down, too.

Saginaw got things set for their one run in the fourth, when Nesser shot a double to first, and Kirby singled to left, which Stutz just deflected a shade into foul territory. He pulled up at second. Dodson worked Quinn for a walk, and then Wright came through with a double to left that scored Nesser.

Two were gone in the eighth, when Dodge was walked. Murphy was safe on a fielder's choice, which cut off Dodge. Hegedorn waited Quinn out, and went to first, and Kirby singled to right, scoring Murphy, who had achieved second on a wild pitch and stolen third rather smartly, while Curry neglected that station for a moment. Nesser was passed, and then Dick Dodson swung on one that should have been a two-bagger, but bounced badly on Rooney, and the bags were emptied of three occupants.

Curry tried to stretch it to home, but was whiffed. Just as Carmen looked over the fourth ball, George Washington slipped into third. Carmen stole second, Kuhn looked at it he had a hit to get rid of, but popped a high foul for the catcher. Shay sent a long fly out to middle. With two gone in the ninth, Curry doubled to left. Fowlkes, batting for Quinn, grounded out, and it was too late. The score:
