

SINN FEINERS AWAIT DEBATE TO 'CLEAR AIR'

Expect Thorough Discussion
Monday in British House
of Commons.

UNIONIST BLUFF CALLED

Lloyd George Receives Con-
gratulations On His
Latest Decision.

LONDON, Oct. 28.—The Irish conference has been suspended until after Monday, the day set for a discussion in the House of Commons of the Government's policy in dealing with the representatives of the Dail Eireann. Even the meetings of the committee representing the Government and Sinn Fein delegates have been suspended for today and tomorrow.

According to information obtained at Sinn Fein headquarters today, however, Prime Minister Lloyd George and Lord Chancellor Birkenhead may meet Arthur Griffith and Michael Collins, the Irish members of the committee on Monday. Some of the members of the Dail delegation, anticipating a blank week-end, had arranged to return to Ireland tonight, but Mr. Griffith asked them to remain in London, lest their return be misunderstood. Moreover, he desired that the situation should be reviewed together the whole situation, preparatory to Monday's debate in the Commons.

Sinn Fein circles were not apprehensive of the debate, but, some of them saying it would serve to "clear the air," to bring out the essentials, and enable them to see how far Parliament would authorize the prime minister to go. If they think this authorization should not extend far enough, they intimated the conference might be broken off.

The latest arrival at Sinn Fein headquarters is William Mellows, a member of the Dail Eireann and one of the organizers of the Easter rebellion, who commanded the rebels in Galway and later escaped to the United States.

Claims Lloyd George Called Unionist Bluff

LONDON, Oct. 28.—Prime Minister Lloyd George will confront the House of Commons next Monday and ask for a mandate relative to the continuance of the negotiations between delegates of the Government and the Dail Eireann. Announcement to this effect by the prime minister yesterday brought to a head the seemingly serious situation which has developed in Dublin since the night of the 24th, when a defection of Unionist leaders and constituencies from support of the Coalition Government.

Belief was expressed by newspapers here today that the Government would receive a big majority in support of the policies it has followed relative to Ireland and that the ministry's hands would be strengthened in dealing with the Sinn Fein representatives.

Mr. Lloyd George received congratulations from the Liberal press for "grasping the nettle of the hard-shelled Unionist opposition," by calling their bluff," knocked the wind out of the Unionists who were sponsors of the vote of censure to the Government, which was passed in the House of Commons on Wednesday.

CHARLES AND ZITA ARE IMPRISONED IN ABBEY

Allied Commissioners Visit Benedictine
Institution at Tihany.

BUDAPEST, Oct. 28.—British, French and Italian military commissioners to Hungary visited the Benedictine Abbey at Tihany yesterday and later made official affidavits that the Count and Countess of Hapsburg-Este were lodged there. The abbey is isolated by a cord of troops.

Hungarian aristocracy involved in the conspiracy to place Charles on the Hungarian throne is now engaged in a bitter fight in the political arena. Small landowners and the landed aristocracy are arrayed against each other in a conflict which is expected to result in stormy scenes in the National Assembly in the next few days.

The peasants have won the first phase of the battle. Count Julius Andrássy, who is of close kinship to the Hapsburg dynasty, is in prison; Count Albert Apponyi is under arrest; and a warrant has been issued for the arrest of Count Anton Sigray, who is alleged to have turned over his command at Oedenburg to Karlists generals following the arrival of the former emperor from Switzerland.

CAPTAIN'S SISTER SAVES WOMAN ON BURNING SHIP

MONTREAL, Oct. 28.—One woman had to be carried off the William P. Hall, collier from Erie, Pa., when fire broke out on board the ship last night and badly damaged the cabin.

The fire was first discovered by Miss Helen Lalonde, sister of the captain, who saw smoke coming from below, gave the alarm. Miss Corinne St. Marselle of Montreal, who had sprained her ankle in the afternoon, was carried off the ladder by Miss Lalonde.

Five streams were used before the fire was brought under control.

BURGLARS MAKE BIG HAUL IN CIGARETTES

St. Catharines, Ont., Oct. 28.—Fifty thousand cigarettes and a quantity of cigars were taken from the D. W. Harmer and former grocery warehouse by automobile burglars during the night.

CONFLICT AT U. S. CONSULATE.
Basle, Switzerland, Oct. 28.—Several hundred communists today attempted to hold a demonstration in front of the United States consulate here in protest against the conviction of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Venzetti in Massachusetts last summer. The police, however, quickly restored order and dispersed the would-be demonstrators.

FEARS COLLAPSE IN CITY HALL

U.S. Railmen Glad Strike Order Cancelled

FEEL SURE NO FURTHER CRISIS WITHOUT A VOTE

Declare Walkout Not Effective Unless Again Referred to Unions.

DECISION IS UNANIMOUS

Board Promises Organizations Will Not Regret Stand Taken.

CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—The official recall of the rail strike order issued by the switchmen, trainmen, conductors, engineers and firemen, were dispatched today when leaders of the "Big Five" dashed code messages to their general chairmen. The chairmen will relay the messages to the locals.

Similar orders probably will be dispatched today by the telegraphers' organization, the only other union that had voted to participate in the strike scheduled to begin Sunday, and which had threatened to tie up the nation's transportation facilities.

While these orders are being circulated, the United States Railroad Labor Board will today announce its findings as a result of the public hearing Wednesday at which union leaders and railroad executives testified. This declaration, it was expected, would analyze the situation and its outcome, the board, according to one member, feeling the matter was now out of its hands.

Turning Point Reached.

The vote ending the strike came late last night after all-day sessions of the union leaders. Early in the day, general chairmen of each of the five organizations conferred separately. In the afternoon a joint session was held, at which the board's findings were discussed. Mr. Hooper's appearance before the board is said by union leaders to have marked the turning point which led to the final decision.

While the vote by organizations was said to have been unanimous, union men asserted today that the vote in the various unions was close and that the firemen, in particular, long remained obstinate.

The final decision seemed pleasing to union men, rail executives and the labor board alike. Union leaders pointed out that they had determined that they could not strike without opposing both the labor board and the administration, while the board and the railroad men, in particular, long remained obstinate.

Rail Executives Satisfied.
Railroad executives expressed satisfaction over the decision. While members of the labor board are not sure whether the action as one the unions will never regret and which has averted inconceivable hardship and an internal industrial dispute, the board, at the international conference at Washington on limitation of armament.

Labor chiefs today asserted that their action of yesterday marked the end of all danger of a strike. As a result of the strike vote taken by the unions, no walkout now being effective until a new vote is taken. No plans being made for another strike vote. W. L. Lee, chief of the trainmen, declared.

Complete plans to avert the most serious handicaps of the threatened strike, which was called off last night, had been made by the Government while the strike still appeared a certainty. District Attorney Cline made known today.

Application for injunctions restraining the brotherhood chiefs from carrying out the strike, with orders necessary to conduct these proceedings, were in the hands of the district court today, the country ready to be represented in federal courts.

The Government program included transportation and a tie-up in the punishment of strike leaders through indictments for conspiracy against the public. These were to be presented to the court 24 hours before the time the strike was scheduled to begin.

B. A. Worthington, president of the Cincinnati, Indianapolis and Western Railroad, today notified Ben W. Hooper, member of the public group of the railroad labor board, in a letter that the road would pay time and a half for overtime dating back from Aug. 1, at which time it was eliminated, until the question is definitely decided by the board.

It was learned today that the code word calling off the railroad strike has not yet been dispatched to the international and Great Northern trainmen, who went out last Saturday. The calling off of their strike was deferred pending determination of their opportunity to return to work.

ENTOMBED ONE WEEK IN COPPER MINE, AND LIVE

Miners Slave Day and Night to Release Comrades.

BRITANNIA BEACH, B.C., Oct. 28.—Two miners were rescued last night from a shaft at the 2,300-foot level in the copper mines here, after exactly a week in their living tomb. The men, Francis Patenaude and L. P. Craig, were working in the narrow shaft last Thursday evening, when a rock slide closed the mouth of the shaft. A little food, a trickle of water and air from a tiny aperture near the top of the shaft kept the men alive, while their workmates slaved day and night to remove the obstruction and set them free. The last boulder was removed at sundown yesterday and rescue gangs entered the shaft.

Patenaude and Craig are in the hospital and are reported to be doing well.

PLEASED WITH AMERICA'S WELCOME



ADMIRAL BEATTY AND WIFE.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—Thousands greeted Admiral Sir David Beatty and his American wife, formerly Ethel Field of Chicago, on their arrival here from England.

Cheering crowds lined the route taken by the party.

Admiral Beatty expressed his appreciation of the welcome accorded him, and predicted that the ties of friendship existing between Great Britain and United States, were bound to become more firmly cemented as these two great English-speaking nations became better acquainted with one another's needs and problems.

LABOR TO FIGHT MASONIC BODY IN DUAL RING ASKS CHARTER

To Nominate Candidates For
Both Federal and Civic
Contests.

Preparation for the approaching municipal, as well as the Federal election, will be outlined at the general labor convention at the Labor Temple Friday evening.

Final organization of the London Labor Party will be undertaken also. This will include the election of officers of the labor board and the ratification of the platform of the Ontario section of the Canadian Labor Party. The latter body was created following the recent Dominion Labor Congress in Winnipeg.

Friday evening's meeting will be open only to regularly accredited delegates from district trades unions and other similar bodies, who attended previous meetings of the party. Delegates from the Labor Representation committee will represent those organizations which have not as yet considered the question of affiliation. Nearly 200 delegates are expected.

The official call has already been issued from labor headquarters for nominations for the federal election. Some half dozen names have already been submitted, and others are anticipated. As considerable business is scheduled to be transacted Friday night the labor officials are not sure whether they shall actually have time to select their candidate the same evening. Should such a condition develop it is proposed to call a nomination meeting Nov. 4.

It has been officially admitted that overtures from the National Liberal and Conservative Party have been received. That the name of Fred J. White among others has been coupled with the invitation to co-operate, has also been admitted.

"There will be a Labor candidate," is the only answer forthcoming from W. M. Stewart, secretary of the Labor Party, when questioned Friday, as to the possibility of organized labor supporting Fred White or any other choice of the Tory party.

BABES UNDER 10 AUTO VICTIMS

MONTREAL, Oct. 28.—At a meeting of the Automobile Club of Canada, called yesterday for the purpose of ascertaining the number of street accidents and fatalities and discussing means for their prevention, Deputy Coroner Prince submitted statistics showing that 53 fatal accidents had occurred this year to date, of which 23 of the victims were children under ten, the average being seven years old. He advocated education of school children by posters placed in schoolrooms and safety first lectures aided by moving pictures.

Foch On Ocean, Phones Response to U. S. Greetings

OTTAWA, Oct. 28.—Ottawa last night had the unique experience of hearing Marshal Foch, generalissimo of the Allied armies while nearing New York harbor on the liner Paris, of which 23 of the miles from Ottawa, reply in person to a message of greeting sent by the American Legion.

The conversation was carried out over wireless telephone between Marshal Foch and Westinghouse Wireless Station, near New York. It was picked up locally by the Royal Canadian Corps of Signals, Ottawa station, between 10 p.m. and 10:20.

Last night's conversation, local officers state, was one of the most remarkable in the history of wireless telephony in Ottawa.

CAFE PROPRIETOR HEAD OF LIQUOR SMUGGLERS

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 28.—The arrest of W. J. Harrington, a cafe proprietor, by federal authorities yesterday, is said by the authorities to have disclosed information that he is the head of an alleged liquor smuggling ring that has been bringing whiskey valued at more than \$500,000 into the state from British Columbia.

AID RUSSIAN SUFFERERS.

PARIS, Oct. 28.—The Chamber of Deputies today adopted a resolution to extend credit amounting to 5,000,000 francs to be used in relief of the Russian famine.

CANNY SCOT TO HIT PIKE WITH HALF DOLLAR

Magistrate Bartlett He'll
Return to Toronto.

BEGGED FROM CITIZENS

Declares He Came to London
in a "Side Door
Pullman."

JAMES GRAHAM is truly Scotch. He's going to demonstrate that he can get to Toronto, and yet he only has 50 cents. Thursday night James was bawling the residents of Bridgeport street. They told police officers who arrived on the scene with the patrol that he had been begging for an overcoat.

Friday morning in police court, the prisoner told Deputy Magistrate P. H. Bartlett that he was also begging for work.

"Where did you come from?" asked the court.

"Toronto," Graham replied.

"How did you get here?" the deputy pursued.

"By freight," was the frank answer. Graham said that he came here to look for work, but on making a tour of inspection thought that he could do better in the Queen City.

"I would like to go back there," he added.

"How much money have you got?" he was asked.

He admitted that he had only 50 cents, but said that he could get back in the same manner that he came.

"Well, you're Scotch, Graham. You ought to be able to go farther than anyone else on 50 cents," remarked Deputy Magistrate Bartlett, as he ordered him escorted to the city limits, where he was to be turned loose with the warning that he was never to return to London.

BUILDING PERMITS FOR OCTOBER VERY NUMEROUS

169 Already Issued, With a Value of \$202,005.

Building permits for October shot past the \$200,000 mark Friday by the issuance of three permits, and bringing the total for the month into the position of being the third largest for October in the city's building history. So far 169 permits have been issued with a value of \$202,005, which is \$15,000 behind October last year, and \$5,000 ahead of October, 1919, which set the record.

R. H. Smith, Toronto street, secured a permit to erect a two-story concrete block store to cost \$20,000. Noble & W. E. Tanner, according to a yet uncompleted plan, are erecting a two-story, cost \$60,000. Mrs. Croden, 233 Hill street, repairs, \$60.

COLLEGIATE TEACHERS WATCH SCHOOL BOARD

Ask Why Salaries Have Not Been Revised.

Has the special committee of the board of education, formed to revise the salaries of public and high school teachers, gone into permanent retirement?

This is the question which has been repeatedly asked by members of the teaching staff of the London Collegiate Institute, who maintain that they have a real grievance as to salary.

W. E. Tanner, secretary of the board of education, looked back through his records on Friday morning and discovered that the committee in question was formed last April, but has as yet selected a chairman, and has not met since.

PASSENGERS SAVED AS JAPANESE SHIP SINKS

SEATTLE, Wn., Oct. 28.—The Japanese steamship Fukui Maru sank 375 miles off Cape Flattery, Wn., at midnight last night in a hurricane, but all her passengers and crew were picked up by the freighter West Ivan, according to a wireless message received by the harbor department here early this morning. She was bound for Seattle from Kobe.

New Lambeth Highway Declared Open On Friday

The highway running south from the city limits to Lambeth was completed Thursday and Friday it was opened for traffic. The provincial highways department may have an official opening at a later date.

The mileage of the new road is 6 1/2 miles, and runs along Elmwood avenue to the Wharfside road, through Lambeth to its southern boundary, with a branch leader running off to the western boundary of the village also. Whether or not the highway is to be continued on to St. Thomas or west to Delaware is not known. The fact that the two leaders out of the village have been laid would indicate that the highway may be extended to both these places.

Since work on the highway was started the officials have experienced considerable difficulty with car drivers invading the wire barriers put up to protect the concrete during the curing period. "Autoists seem to think they have the right to go anywhere," said Inspector Sears.

URGES CANADA TO GET RID OF PARTY SPIRIT

Walter McRays and William
Ward Address Local
Kiwanians.

LAUDS CANADA'S HEROES

Dominion's Greatest Asset Is
Her Growing Generation,
Says Speaker.

LONDON KIWIANS turned out in force to the noonday luncheon in the Tecumseh House Friday and heard two splendid addresses by William Ward of London, England, president of the World's Brotherhood movement, and Walter McRays, introduced by Tom Roy as an "Apostle of Canadianism."

Mr. McRays pleaded for a real Canadian spirit, such as took our forefathers through the pioneer days.

"It is high time we started a Canadian national consciousness, or conscience," he stated. "Canada was never advertised through the countries of the world as she is today through the splendid work of the Canadian boys in the war. Their adventures were no thing of chance. The wonderful stories of pioneer days are too little known. There should be more about their exploits taught in the schools. The real makers of Canada sleep in lonely country churchyards unknown."

"We are dead to a national spirit of Canadianism," declared the speaker. "We have reached the point where we are either going to be a Canadian people or a group of persons looking to others for leadership."

Calls It Silly Dictum.
"It is a silly dictum that children belong to the same race as their parents. On our birth certificates we find that the world of Canada must not be used in describing nationality as it indicates citizenship. In other words the children of Canada belong to the race of their parents, English, Asiatic or African."

"The pride that ought to be of any man born in Canada is that he is a Canadian," stated Mr. McRays, amid applause. "Don't worry about the British Empire. She has weathered worse storms than the Irish question."

"Our greatest asset is her growing generation. Get rid of party spirit, and take your own motto, 'We build' as your password. Let us see how much we can put into Canada, not how much we can take out."

"We want to throw into Canada all the splendid patriotism and citizenship that we did into the war, and get back the sterling spirit of the pioneers. Then we will build a Canada grander, better and worthier of all the great sacrifices made by our boys overseas."

Mr. Ward on rising to his feet stated that although this was his first appearance at a Kiwanian luncheon, he felt entirely at home, as the work being done by Kiwanians was similar to that of the Brotherhood.

Outlined Work.
Mr. Ward briefly outlined the work being done by the World's Brotherhood and told of the work done in the interests of Serbian and other children. One hundred youngsters from Serbia had been taken to England and educated, so much so that they had beaten English boys and girls, both in examinations and on the athletic field.

Mr. Ward spoke of the work being done by the World's Brotherhood, which was being taken care of in industrial orphanages.

"Pinkie" Bios a new member, Cliff Gray and Harry Leckey won the prizes for the "booster" for the day, Ken Casselman.

Arthur Ford gave a short report on the recent convention in Montreal, and also extended an invitation to all members on behalf of the Canadian Club to attend next Friday's luncheon, when Lieut.-Col. Harry Cockshutt, Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, will be the guest of honor.

New Lambeth Highway Declared Open On Friday

SLADE IS HELD ON CHARGE OF ATTEMPTED MURDER

Identified as "Lone Bandit" Who Held Up Bank in Hamilton.

MONTREAL, Oct. 28.—Albert Slade, arrested Wednesday night in connection with the abortive hold-up in the branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce here on Tuesday, was arraigned yesterday afternoon before Judge Chubb on a charge of attempted murder. It is alleged that Slade is the man who fired at Bank Teller Drew.

Patrick O'Hara, identified as the man who was in the automobile that drove away from the bank with the hold-up man, was also arrested and charged with complicity.

Both men pleaded not guilty and were remanded to Bordeaux jail until Monday for a preliminary hearing. Albert Slade was identified today as the "lone bandit" who held up and robbed the Bank of Hamilton in Hamilton last July. This was established by Eugene Laframme, Bertillon expert here, who took his finger prints, which corresponds with those of Norman Ryan, alias Norman J. Bell, as described in a circular in the hands of the officer. Chief Lepage stated last night that he thought O'Hara would also be found to have been connected with the Hamilton bank robbery.

FIRST NAVAL SCHOOL OPENED IN HALIFAX

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 28.—His majesty's Canadian youths' training establishment for the training of boys for ratings in the Canadian navy and the first school of its kind in Canada, was opened here yesterday. The school is situated at Nova Scotia at H.M.C. dockyard here yesterday. Sixty boys are now at the establishment and forty others will join in the spring. They come from many parts of Canada.

PIPER AFRAID CITY CLERK IN GRAVE DANGER

Order Moving of Furniture To
Keep Weak Floor From
Falling.

BARS LARGE MEETINGS

Seeks To Prevent Repetition
of Catastrophe in January, 1898.

Should there be no immediate removal of furniture and other paraphernalia in the office of the Soldiers' Aid Commission, above City Clerk St. Baker's department in the city hall, it is claimed that there is a strong possibility that the entire floor may give way.

A warning to this effect has been issued by City Building Inspector H. Piper to Edward Lance, secretary of the commission. The strain on the floor, the inspector maintains, is so excessive it has prompted him to order immediate action. Piper terms the condition dangerous and advocates that something be done to remedy conditions without delay.

The offices were formerly occupied by the board of education, who eagerly grasped an opportunity to get offices in the new utilities building rather than face the danger of being suddenly precipitated on top of City Clerk Baker and his office force.

It is common knowledge that the city inspector has already taboed any excessive gathering of citizens in the council chamber above, the city hall officer, although the floor has been bolstered up, it is still materially below the level where it was originally constructed.

Advocates of a new city hall in London are insistent that something be accomplished as soon as possible before another such catastrophe occurs as attended the collapse of the old city hall on Richmond street on January 1, 1898, when 22 persons met death and 50 were injured.
