

PREMIER BONAR LAW OUTLINES HIS PROGRAM

Receives Rousing Welcome
When He Addresses Glas-
gow Audience.

REVIEWS SITUATION

Confident That Settlement
Will Be Reached in
Near East.

OTTAWA, Oct. 26.—(By Canadian Press).—Canada's attitude in the matter of attending a conference on economic and trade questions of the Empire, such as outlined by Right Hon. Bonar Law in his speech at Glasgow today, will not be determined officially until the formal invitation from the new British Government is received, according to members of the cabinet who are now in the city.

GLASGOW, Scotland, Oct. 26.—A rousing ovation was given Prime Minister Bonar Law when he arose to address an audience of 1,000 persons in St. Andrew's Hall tonight, and set forth the principles upon which his party stood. He devoted the opening of his speech to an explanation of how he came to resume the leadership of his party.

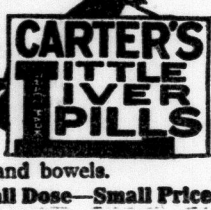
This came about, said the prime minister, when it was realized that the coalition was losing ground and a split in the party was inevitable, not through intrigues, but owing to discontent in the constituencies throughout the country, which were clearly determined to terminate the existing Parliament and start afresh under different conditions.

Mr. Bonar Law said he believed it would have added to the strength of labor to have set up a party, on the one hand representing opinions opposed to labor, and on the other a party representing labor alone.

Mr. Bonar Law's speech largely covered the same ground as his afternoon speech and his election address. He emphasized the necessity of a Near East settlement, and the necessity for showing an intention

GIVE LLOYD GEORGE ROUSING WELCOME

Mayor of Colchester Entertains Group of Noted Politicians.

COLCHESTER, Oct. 26.—Former Prime Minister Lloyd George, Lord Birkenhead, the lord chancellor of the late cabinet, the lord mayor of London and a group of his sheriffs were the principal guests given a rousing welcome among a party entertained by the mayor of Colchester here today.

Lord Birkenhead, introducing Mr. Lloyd George at the banquet, said the former premier and himself, with a fuller realization than their opponents of the difficulties of the government's problems, would afford the government every help within their power, and would put country before party. Mr. Lloyd George followed with a brief speech.

PAYS TRIBUTE TO PREACHERS

Lloyd George Speaks To Large Gathering in Whitfield Tabernacle.

Former Premier Tells of Interviews With Famous Clergymen.

LONDON, Oct. 26.—(By the Associated Press).—"There are some people who are doomed to be in tempests and storms," began former Premier Lloyd George before a large tonight.

"My life is one perpetual crisis after another, and I had hoped that when I ceased to be responsible for them I would enjoy a little leisure and repose."

After paying tribute to the great movement led by John Wesley and George Whitfield, he declared Whitfield as the greatest orator produced by the English race.

"I am not talking about Wales," he added, "for undoubtedly during the 18th century and the first part of the 19th century Wales produced a larger number of popular orators of the first water than any country whose history I have read."

"A short time ago I had the privilege of talking to John Wesley at a Methodist gathering. I pointed out the effect of the Whitfield-Wesley movement upon the political outlook of England and America, in comparison with the attitude of continental countries."

Cheers Remarks.

"The training is the same. How can you feel it? America responds to practically the same appeals as England does; you could see recently in the attitude America adopted towards the Near Eastern question, America was the only country in complete sympathy with the attitude of England, and that sympathy was overwhelming and real. It was certainly attributable to the fact that the moral training of America was identical with ours—the old Pilgrim Fathers, reinforced by the great ideals of Whitfield and Wesley."

"I don't know the exact figures of our debt to America; I am told it is a thousand millions at the present moment. It is nothing to the debt America owes us. I should like to write the balance-sheet—debit, one thousand and ninety millions; credit, John Wesley and George Whitfield."

"I am not talking about Shakespeare, Burns and Milton, who are all in the account, and Roger Williams and the Pilgrim Fathers. Oh! I could run up a bill against America which would bankrupt even that rich country. They don't keep these accounts in the exchequer, but they are things which matter. Whitfield and Wesley broadened America into the war with instinct; the result of their preaching and their teaching was to move America to come to our aid."

"George Whitfield and John Wesley are going to take America by the hand and lead her through the golden portals to the League of Nations. The ex-premier's remarks were greeted with prolonged cheers. The remainder of his speech consisted of reminiscences of clergymen he had known and breakfasted with at his Downing street residence."

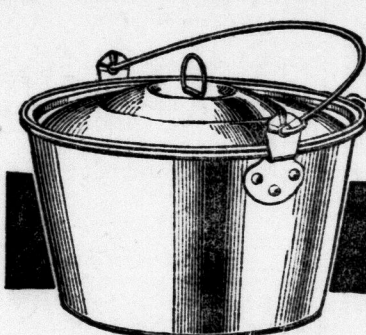
