Kent and Essex Fight the Corn-Borer.

Farmers of Essex and Kent who grow corn, and there are few who do not, are facing a serious situation in the increasing extent to which the corn-borer has invaded the fields. The Essex Free Press tells of a trip made through the two counties with a dominion entomologist, and is responsible for the statement that for 40 miles along the lake shore almost every corn field had from 70 to 100 per cent of the plants

infected. Four years ago the corn-borer was almost unknown in Kent and Essex; today its presence is so serious that it threatens the destruction of the crop. Many of the corn growers are preparing to fight this pest, which has made its appearance in other sections of Western Ontario. Three rules given are:

Feed as much of the plant as live stock will eat, for the presence of the corn-borer does not affect the animals.

Burning the unconsumed stalks and cobs. Plowing under all remnants left in the field r elsewhere.

The practice followed on many farms of leaving the stalks uncut is too dangerous to be continued. It makes an ideal condition for the borer to multiply. At a recent meeting of the League of Nations at Genoa, there were indications that the A dominion official says the locking up of world is coming nearer to the point of recogthe destiny of a nation, than itself.

Both Mr. Herriot and Mr. MacDonald recognize that superior force must be applied against any nation breaking the peace. The day of one nation taking matters in its own hands and defending its own honor or interests, is past. It will have the whole world against it.

Mr. Herriot was inclined to apply this force toward economic pressure, but both of them saw that there can be no peace in the world until the ultimate arbiter of destiny is made something else than the nation itself.

It is a difficult matter for anyone to realize that he may be wrong. He is so close to his own interests that the importance of them is magnified in his own eyes. But the very existence of law is that he must submit his rights to white an impartial tribunal, and that no man has a right to take his own honor or interests into his

We acknowledge that such action is submersive to law when it is between two individuals, health but we have not yet got to the point where we realize that it is equally submersive of law between two nations.

Some day we shall get there. National vanities, egotism and patriotism must bow down before the common good.

There are two causes of war, as Mr. Hoover brings out in a recent book. These causes are the vanity of nations, and their fear. To strike able out war, therefore, we must lower our egotism and defy our fears. One hundred per cent Americanism must give way to one hundred per cent positively relieves constipation. At humanity and the fear of other nations must

give way to trust in them. There is no way to run this world and its nations, just as there is no way to get along individually, without faith in one another.

Faith is not only the foundation of neighborly peace and of commerce, but it must be made the foundation of politics.

Every nation is inclined to believe in the villainy and chicanery of other and in its own honesty of purpose, but we must get to the point where we all believe in each other, trust each other, and are willing to submit our destinies and interests to some impartial tribunal, or there can be no such thing as peace upon earth. The League of Nations was an effort toward

this and we shall welcome any better one

Freighter Glenorchy Rammed by Miller-Entire Crew Is Saved.

Detroit, Oct. 29.-The big Canadian ake freighter Glenorchy, laden with grain from Fort William to Port Col-borne, was rammed and sunk in Lake Huron today by the steamer Leonard B. Miller, of the Columbia Steamship Company, Cleveland, at a point some ten miles off Harbor Beach, Mich. Glenorchy went down in twenty athoms. The crew of twenty-one men and a woman cook was taken off by the Miller without mishap. The Miller, reported to be badly damaged, is on its way down the lake, escorted by the steamer Samuel Mather. She is expected to reach Port Huron early Thursday, and till then details will not be available.


