



GRAND PRESENTS "THE LOST TRIBE"

Picture Depicting Life and Appearance of Cannibals Proves Interesting.

"The Lost Tribe," a motion picture showing cannibals in their native haunts in the wilds of New Guinea, opened at the Grand yesterday afternoon and will be shown for the balance of the week.

The picture takes its name from the appearance of the savages, Captain Frank Hurley, in making explorations of the swamps of that little-known land, came across a tribe of head-hunters whose features are peculiarly semitic, hence the name.

The producers have used every available means to bring an unusually good picture to America. A small boat of light draught and two seaplanes were used to work into the heart of a district hitherto untouched by white men. For weeks the boat slowly made its way through the swamps, guided from above by the planes, which had located the vil-

lages of the cannibals. The story is vividly portrayed and told with breezy subtleties. The photography is excellent. Color effects in sepia, brilliant red and pale blues and grays add much to the beauty of the scenes. The film shows splendid views of the much-talked-of life in the South Sea Islands. It also explodes many of the theories concerning the bewitching life and alluring damsels of the coral strands. It does show, though, the natives; the sleek, muscular men, hideous in their feathered war dress; the women, none too fetching, in their savage finery; and of course the children, always in any country or setting, cute and interesting.

Giving credit where credit is due, these cannibals are no mean architects and engineers when a house or a temple is wanted. Their churches are as big as zepplins, and look not unlike these great air vessels. Some of the shrines are 500 feet long and 50 feet high. They are made of reeds and grass. The villages are worth peering into.

There are a couple of scenes showing the gruesome remains of banquets, where tribesmen contributed themselves to a menu enjoyed by fellow-townsmen. Skulls seem to be as plentiful in New Guinea as cobbles in Belfast.

"The Lost Tribe" appears the wanderlust without discomfort.

BLANCH SWEET STARS AT LOEW'S

"Tess of the D'Urbervilles" Proves Delightful Upon the Screen.

"Tess of the D'Urbervilles," Marshall Neilan's picture production of Thomas Hardy's famous novel, is undoubtedly the feature of Loew's program for the latter part of this week, as the three vaudeville acts could only be called fair.

Ernie Gordon and Evelyn Delmar bring some old-time plantation melodies in "Blues" style. Manny Besser and Bert Keller put on an act called "The Screen Test," which attempts to show how a Valentino acts into the movies.

Helen "Smiles" Davis and her partner in "Songs, Laughter and Steps," provide the best of the vaudeville attractions. Miss Davis is best in her burlesque of a grand opera prima donna.

"Tess of the D'Urbervilles," a story of enduring love, was played by a cast headed by Blanch Sweet in the title role. Conrad Nagel appeared as Angel Clare, the likable hero, whose romance with the little dairy maid ended in tragedy for both.

George Fawcett, the veteran character actor, played the part of Tess's dissolute father, while Victory Bateman was the mother.

The true atmosphere of England was injected into the film by the simple expedient of making the exterior scenes in the villages of which Hardy wrote.

The comedy picture, "Why Hurry?" an Aesop's fable cartoon that was really good, and "Topics of the Day" concluded the program.

The Home Chef's Suggestions for Sunday's Menu

Breakfast. Sliced Oranges. Fried Hominy. Honey. Crisp Bacon.

Milk. Luncheon. Cabbage. Martha. Stuffed Tomatoes. Hot Rolls.

Milk. Pineapple Jelly. Tea. Dinner. Puree of Tomatoes. Ripe Olives.

Planked Ham Steak. Brussels Sprouts. Buttered Rice. Lettuce and Pepper Salad. Banana Pie.

Milk. Coffee. STUFFED CABBAGE.

Run through the fine knife of the meat chopper half a pound of lean boiled ham and half a pound of cooked beef; add to the meat one small onion and one seeded green pepper and run through the chopper again. Season high with salt, nutmeg, paprika and allspice; add one beaten egg, one tablespoonful of catsup and enough water to moisten. Boil a small head of cabbage for 20 minutes; cut out the stalk with a sharp knife and fill the cavity with the meat mixture; tie over the whole a small head of cabbage and steam one hour. Serve with melted butter.

PUREE OF TOMATOES. Bring one quart of milk to a boil and stir into it two tablespoonfuls of butter and a seasoning of salt and pepper. Bring two cupfuls of strained tomatoes to a boil, add one-quarter of a teaspoonful of soda and half a cupful of cracker crumbs; stir the tomatoes into the hot milk and serve at once.

PLANKED HAM STEAK. Have the butcher cut a two and half pound slice from the center of a good ham; place in a baking dish, almost cover with cider, sprinkle with two teaspoonfuls of whole cloves and bake two hours, or until tender. Lift out to a hot platter and garnish with mounds of seasoned rice and Brussels sprouts.

LETTUCE AND PEPPER SALAD. Rub a cold bowl with a clove of crushed garlic, remove the garlic and mix in the bowl two heads of shredded lettuce, two chopped seeded green peppers, one chopped pimiento and a dressing made by mixing until smooth half a teaspoonful of salt, one-quarter of a teaspoonful of paprika, two tablespoonfuls of lemon juice, four tablespoonfuls of olive oil, four tablespoonfuls of thick cream and one chopped, hard-boiled egg.

Story Declares Wilson Forced To Separate British and French Premiers.

DUEL IS PROPOSED

London, Nov. 13.—Publication of a book written by H. Wyckham Stead, former editor of the Times, entitled "Through Thirty Years," today brought from Lloyd George a strong denial of a passage in the volume, which related that during the peace conference at Versailles, Premier Clemenceau of France "accused Lloyd George so flatly of repeated inaccuracy of statements that Lloyd George seized him by the collar and demanded an apology, and after President Wilson had separated them, Clemenceau offered Lloyd George reparation with pistols or swords."

In reply, Mr. Stead said: "I should certainly not have published a story of that kind without having verified it in advance from persons who were present."

The author added that he had no intention of entering into a personal controversy in the matter.

A. R. FORD FAVORS
PLAN OF PREMIER

Londoner Believes Powers of Senate Should Be Curbed—Addresses Lions.

In an address to the Lions' club last night Arthur R. Ford of this city expressed approval of the suggestion made by Premier W. L. Mackenzie King for the curtailment of the power of the Canadian senate.

Mr. Ford endorsed as "a sensible suggestion" the proposal of Premier King "to clip the wings" of the senate by legislation, to the effect that any bill passed three times by the house of commons should automatically become law, despite action of the senate.

While urging that a senator's term of service be limited to 10 years, Mr. Ford stated that he was not in favor of the senate being made an elective body.

Elections Enough. "We have enough elections now," he remarked, "and besides, elections for the senate would be both expensive and difficult, since they would have to extend over large territories."

"I am not in favor of the abolition of the senate," said Mr. Ford, "because it has proved itself a useful chamber, and safeguards the interests of the smaller provinces because of the basis of representation in allotting 24 senators to each of four senatorial districts, the Maritime Provinces, Quebec, Ontario and the western provinces, but I would favor a proportionate reduction in the number of senators."

It was announced that over 30 of the members of the club would motor to Tillsonburg tonight to participate in the charter night festivities of the Tillsonburg Lions club, which has over 60 members.

Lions Col. C. M. R. Graham and James Orme were presented with eversharp pencils for their efforts in disposing of tickets for the club dance and entertainment, to be held in the Winter Gardens next Tuesday night.

Lion Col. Graham reported having received word from the Lions clubs of Toronto, Buffalo, St. Catharines, Goderich, Strathroy and Hamilton that delegations varying in strength from 10 to 60 would attend the dance from those clubs.
