ANNUAL MEETING OF MUNICIPAL COUNCIL

Coun. Murchie, Chosen Warden.
Council Getting Down to Business—Patriotic Fund

The annual meeting of the Restigouche Municipal Council convened at the Council Chambers, Dalhousie, on Tuesday at 11 o'clock.
Upon assembling Coun. Lawlor was chosen chairman, preparatory to organizing the council.

Moved by Coun. Montgomery, seconded by Coun. Peters that Coun. Murchie be elected Warden. Carried.
The Council then proceeded to the business of the day and the session was a speedy termination.

NO NIGHT SERVICE TO DALHOUSIE

Passengers Arriving at Junction During Night Must Remain There for Hours

For over thirty years Dalhousie has enjoyed a day and night train service, both summer and winter, and now, without a moment's warning the citizens of the shiretown have had half their connections with the outside world cut off. This is to say, the road to Dalhousie is closed after 7 P. M.

This is a state of affairs which should not be tolerated and citizens are taking the matter up energetically with the hope that something will be done to restore their former service.

Two of the principal trains, the Marquette express, reach Dalhousie at night, and if there are passengers for Dalhousie they must make themselves comfortable in the station until daylight, when the first train goes in to the shiretown.

Again if Campbellton people wish to go to the shiretown to spend a social evening, to curl or skate, they must take their grip with them prepared to stay all night and get home next day in time for dinner, or walk to the Junction, a pretty state of affairs.

This is an insult to the town of Dalhousie, to its citizens, which should not be allowed to remain.

The plea of the management of the Government railway is that the night service does not pay. Even if this is a fact, and it undoubtedly is, yet the convenience of a large body of people should count for more than mere dollars and cents.

Let the service be restored at the earliest possible moment.

MONTENEGRO STILL FIGHTING VIOLENTLY

Negotiations Broken Off.—Russians Continue Offensive.—Submarine Ashore

Paris, Jan. 19, via London, Jan. 20.—The Journal Des Debats says it is officially announced that King Nicholas of Montenegro and his family and suite have sailed for Italy, peace negotiations between Austria and Montenegro having been broken off.

London, Jan. 19.—After only a slight pause since the conclusion of the "New Year's Battle," on the eastern front, the Russians again have begun a strong offensive against the Austro-Hungarians on the Bessarabian frontier east of Czernowitz, capital of Bukovina.

Vienna had a forecast that the second phase of the battle in this region was imminent by the announcement that the Russians were throwing strong reinforcements into East Galicia.

In the initial offensive of what probably will be termed the "Second Battle," the Russians launched, with numerous columns, four attacks near Toporutz and Boyan, but, according to Vienna, they were everywhere repulsed.

The Germans have attacked Russian bases at Tarnopol, East Galicia, with an air squadron.

While the Turkish war office asserts that the Russians in the Caucasus have abandoned their offensive along the entire front of nearly a hundred miles, owing to the reinforcement of the Ottomans and their assumption of a violent offensive, the latest Russian official communication describes the Turkish army in this region as having been disorganized and dislodged from a strong position, extending over sixty-six miles, the Turkish retreat taking on the character of a panic-stricken flight.

Several Turkish units, the communication adds, were almost annihilated, hundreds of bodies covering the fields of battle.

A British submarine has gone ashore off Holland. No loss of life.

BATHURST CURLERS DEFEATED
Halifax, N. S., January 19.—By a margin of 27 points, the Mayflower curlers defeated the Bathurst, N. B., team in the final match of the M. L. L. Cup.

Four rinks from each club competed and the total scores were Mayflower 59, Bathurst 53.

RECRUITING QUIET ALONG NORTH SHORE

Cold Weather Interferes With Work.—Only 22 For the Week

Recruiting in Restigouche has been very quiet during the past week. Last week only 22 men were signed on for the whole county.

The extremely cold weather has interfered with this work. Also the fact that the Battalion surgeon, Dr. Parks of Chatham is here going over the recruits and weeding out the unfit, has also interfered with the work.

About forty men have been turned down on the final examination.

The men are now settled in barracks and will soon resume regular duties.

The weather of the past two weeks, together with the snow has made drilling in the open exceedingly uncomfortable for the members of A Co. of the 132nd. On Friday afternoon a meeting of the Recruiting committee was held, and it was decided to ask Col. Thompson, A. A. G. of Halifax to have one of the large car sheds at the International station prepared for drilling in. A reply has been received saying that the matter had been referred to Col. Mersereau for his report.

IMPROVEMENTS AT McLENNAN FOUNDRY

New Warehouse Erected and Machine Shop Rearranged Sprinkler System Put in

When the fire of 1910 destroyed the old McLennan Foundry and Machine Works, Limited, plant new buildings were planned which were thought would be sufficient for some time to come, but business has increased so rapidly that several new buildings have been erected since that time, the latest of these being a fine two-story machine shop and covered. At present a large force of men are engaged placing a sprinkler system throughout all the buildings as an additional protection against fire. This system is being put in by T. H. Higginson Co. Ltd. of Montreal, and is the very latest in such appliances.

The main machine shop has been renovated and the interior whitened, which brightens it up. All the machines are being rearranged so as to converse labor, and facilitate the dispatch of work. At the present time considerable new contracts are under way, and the plant is being added to for the manufacture of six inch shells.

Just as soon as the machinery arrives, and is set up, and it is expected daily, two shifts will be put on and the shop run day and night. Already new men are being put to work and this will mean much in increased wages to our men.

Out of total orders for shells amounting to \$191,424,186 placed in Canadian firms up to September 1st, 1915, the following were distributed in the Maritime Provinces:

Amherst, \$544,625; Chatham, \$120,000; Dartmouth, N. S., \$67,000; Fredericton, \$120,000; Halifax, \$20,000; Hillsboro, \$20,000; Moncton, \$92,000; New Glasgow, N. S., \$3,930,184; St. Stephen, \$25,000; Sackville, \$120,000; Sydney, \$2,000,000; Sussex, \$20,000; St. John, \$558,250; Truro, N. S., \$150,000; Yarmouth, \$85,000.

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
