The World two days ago referred to a syndicate which was endeavoring to get control of The Empire newspaper. Later information shows that a determined effort is being made to get hold of it by freezing out the sharcholders, who have sunk \$200,000 in it, and turning it over for nothing to the syndicate in question.
