"Armenia is in her last gasp. The work of extermination continues. The massacred people number 10,000. Half a million survivors have taken refuge in the forests and mountains where a million survivors have taken refuge in the forests and mountains where they are feeding upon herbs and roots. Hunger and cold have begun to ravage greatly. In the name of humanity and Christianity, save us."

Kurds Disposing of Their Plunder. London, Dec. 12.—A despatch from the United Press correspondent at Constantinople, yesterday's date, says: "Kurds and other Armenian marauders and pillagers are coming into Constantinople in large numbers for the purpose of disposing of their plunder. It is expected that out-breaks will continue throughout Asia Minor, but on a smaller scale than hitherto."

Athens, Dec. 12.—A strong detachment of Turkish troops on Tuesday attacked the positions occupied by the Christians at Vryse on the Island of Crete. The troops lost 35 killed and wounded, while the loss of the Christhe island is quiet.

Rome, Dec. 12.—General Baratieri's account of the battle with the Abyssinians at Ambalizim resulting in the partial annihilation of the Major Tosselli's force of Italian troops, shows that the Italians threw their cannons, mules, ammunition, etc., into an abyss in order to prevent the enemy from
