DEATH OF A. E. ROBLEE

Well Known Manufacturer Who Helped to Form East End Baptist Church

[Cleveland (Ohio) Plain Dealer] Albert Edward Roblee, president and treasurer of the Buckeye Oil & Paint Co., 25474 E. 39th street, and charter member of the East End Baptist church, Euclid avenue and E. 97th street, has passed away after an illness of more than six months.

Funeral services were held at Wade Memorial chapel, Lake View cemetery. He died at the home of his brother in law, E. G. Neville, 24 Villa Beach, Nottingham. The Roblee residence is at 1865 Idlewood avenue, East Cleveland.

Mr. Roblee, who was 59, was born in Nova Scotia. He had been in Cleveland thirty five years. He started the concern of which he was president three years ago. Before that he was general manager of the Atlas Oil Co., for twenty two years.

His widow, Mrs. Bertha Spear Roblee, and two children, Mrs. Helen Roblee Loose, and Judson Roblee, survive him.

Mr. Roblee was a son of Judson and Sybil Roblee, formerly of Lower Granville, Nova Scotia. Besides his son and daughter who survives him, he also leaves a sister, Mrs. Edward W. Spurr, of Jersey City, N. J.

D. A. R. EXPRESS LEAVES THE RAILS

Two of the Crew Received Injuries No Passengers Hurt

A special telephone message to the MONITOR Saturday morning stated that the Dominion Atlantic Railway express which left Halifax at seven o'clock, railway time, for Yarmouth, left the rails about half mile east of Hantsport station three hours later. No passengers were injured. Cecil Pentz, baggage master, and Harry Taylor, one of the crew were the only persons hurt.

The train was approaching Hantsport station when the accident occurred. The engine, tender, baggage, mail and express cars left the rails. The cause of the derailing is not known.

The express carried a large number of passengers, many of whom were bound to Yarmouth, to go on the Northland to Boston. A train with passengers left Hantsport at 12.15 for Yarmouth. Among the Bridgetown passengers on the train were E. A. Hicks, Max Gesner, Barnaby and Harold Anderson.

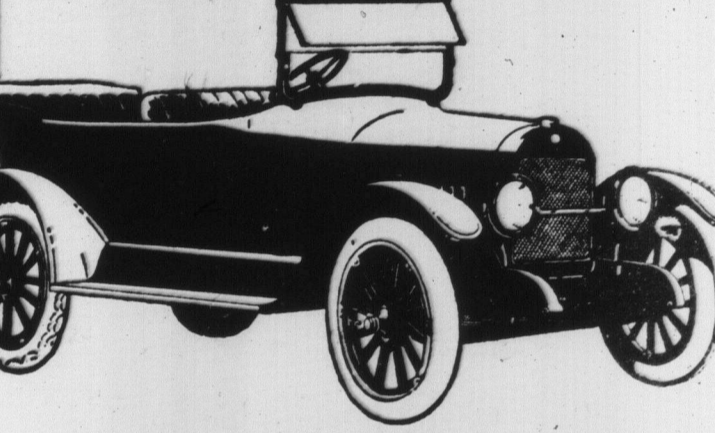
