As we intimated in our last issue new complications have arisen in this now somewhat celebrated case. Mr. Oxharat and his foreman Thebo were arrested at Brandon at the instance of Mr. Sub-Collector of Customs, Bannerman, on a charge of attempting to defraud the Revenue by making away with the forty-five horses, which were supposed to have been stolen. Several others were charged with complicity in the transaction, but no warrants have yet been issued for their arrest. Mr. Oxharat and his man were brought to Calgary under arrest, and a preliminary examination was commenced on Wednesday, September 24, before Major Dowling, J.P. Messrs Bleeker and Fitz-Cochrane appeared for the prosecution, and Messrs. Lougheed and Peterson for the defence. After two or three witnesses had been examined the prosecution applied for an adjournment of one week in order to get time to procure additional witnesses, (some twenty of whom have been subpoenaed). At the request of the accused the time was adjourned until the 15th of October. In the meantime the accused were admitted to bail. As we before remarked the case being sub judice we refrain from further comment at present.
