Since our last, the supplies of grain have been pretty liberal, and layers seem confident now that the arrivals will continue to increase. Accounts from Britain still speak of unfavourable weather, and there is too much reason to fear that the crops there will be far below the average. On the other side of the lake the crops were never better; and in Capada we have great reason to be thankful for a most boystiful harvest.

FALL WHEAT .- There has been very little done in Pall Wheat during the week, and the supply may be quoted at between 8,000 and 4,000 bushels. Of this there was very little old grain; and the difference in price between the old and new grain is very little, provided the latter is in good condition. The current prices may be quoted as follows. Best, from \$1.17 to \$2.22. common and inferior, \$1.05 to \$1.15 per bushel.

STRING WHEAT .- There has been very little dore in this grain, the supply being only limited, New spring wheat has sold for \$1.04 per bushel.

OATS are in good supply, and sell at from 80s. to 320, per bushel.

Pras realise from 550, to 600, per lushel.

FLOUR.-A dollness in the flour trade since our last has roled this market, and prices remain at about our last quotations.

HAT.—The price of hay is from \$12 to \$16 per lon.

STRAW.-There is no straw offering. It is much wanted, and high prices would be paid.

POTATORS are very plentiful, at from 80a, to 40a. per bushel.

British is very source, and on this account prices have gone up to an unners, height. Fresh has been sold during the week at from 20c, to 25c. per lh. No. 1 tub butter sells readily at 15a. and No. 2 at from 18c, to 14c, per lb.

Ross are plentiful, at 180, per doz. retail.

FRUIT.-Apples \$1 to \$2, and Pears \$2 to \$5 per harrel. Peaches 750, to \$1.25 per basket. Pluma \$1 to \$2, and Tomatoes 60c., per bushel. Water Melma, 200. In 250, each.
