Numerous tables enrich the alphabet and place an immense amount of information clearly and conveniently at hand. Examples may be found in the tables of *Doses* and *Bacteria*. It is safe to call *Dunglison's Medical Dictionary* an indispensable book for students, practitioners, pharmacists, dentists and all concerned with any of the medical sciences.

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
