Irelands' Census Returns.

To-day we are able to publish additional figures from Irish census returns. They show that the total population on April 1st last was 4,-450,540, being a decrease of 248,-204, or 5.8 per cent., since April 1st, 204, or 5.3 per cont., since April 1st, 1891. The males were, 2,197,739, and females 2,258,807 Divided by religious denominations the numbers are:—Catholies, 8,310,028, or 237,270 less than in '91; Protestants, 570,385, or 20,718 less than in '91; Presbyterians, 443,491, or 1,480 less than in '91; Methodists, 61,255, or an increase of 5,745.
