MARITIME AIRWAYS COMPANIES APPLICATIONS

Mr. Bell:

1. Have any independent maritime airways companies made application to the federal transport commission in 1954? If so, what were the results? 2. Have any of the applications involved permission to transport commodities such as fish from the maritimes to central Canada?

Mr. Langlois (Gaspe):

1. Yes.

Decisions on applications:—(1) Application by Eastern Provincial Airways Limited, for authority to serve the additional points Nain, Black Tickle and St. Charles river under licence No. A.T.B. 466/50(NS) and for the discontinuance of the authority to serve Burlington, Western Arm, Grey island harbour and Porcupine, all in the province of Newfoundland.

Decisions:—Application approved. Date: January 22, 1954.

(2) Application by Maritime Central Airways, Ltd., for a licence to operate a class 1 scheduled commercial air service to transport persons, mails and/or goods, serving Moncton, New Brunswick, Goose Bay, Gander and Torbay, Newfoundland.

Decision:—Application for a class 1 service between Moncton and Goose Bay approved, and approval granted to operate a class 3 service between Goose Bay, Gander and Torbay.

(3) Application by Eastern Provincial Airways Limited for a licence to operate a class 3 irregular specific point commercial air service to transport persons, mails and/or goods from a base at Torbay, Newfoundland, serving: Cartwright, Rigolet, Nain, Makkovik, and Hopedale, via Goose Bay.

Decision:—Application amended and decision deferred.

(5) (1) Application by Royal Cooper, proposing to carry on business under the firm name and style of New Brunswick Air Taxi, for a licence to operate a class 4 group "B" charter commercial air service to transport persons and/or goods between points within Canada, from a base at Moncton, New Brunswick.

Application withdrawn by applicant on March 2, 1954.

CANS FOR CHICKEN

Mr. MacLean:

1. What sizes of cans are permitted in Canada for the canning of chicken?

2. What sizes of cans of chicken are permitted entry into Canada from the United States?

Mr. McCubbin:

1. The regulations under the Live Stock and Live Stock Products Act relating to packing, grading and labelling of canned poultry applicable to products entering interprovincial trade are 7 and 16 ounces net weight.

2. Imported product is not subject to any requirement with respect to container size unless it enters into interprovincial trade in Canada in which case it is subject to the same regulations as cover canned product in the same class of trade.
