If we are to emerge from conditions which are so perilously near chass, it is obvious that we must back men to think straight. By ending crocked thinking we shall emerge from a withess wasdaring in the wilderness into the promised land of light and life and love.

Today there is upon us all the compulsion to be thorough and to be patient. We must clear our world of its stones and woods and refresh the intellectual and moral ground of our civilization. Today events are searching out the true stuff of our national charabout about actor.
