+ ARTICLE III.

"It is agreed that the people of the United States fhall continue to enjoy, unmolested, the right to take fish, of every kind, on the Grand Bank, and on all the other banks of Newsoundland; also in the Gulph of St. Lawrence, and at all other places in the sea, where the inhabitants of both countries used at any time heretofore to sish; and also that the inhabitants of the United States shall have liberty to take sish, of every kind, on such parts of the coast of Newsoundland as British sishermen shall use, (but not to dry or cure the same on shatisland); and also on the coasts, bays, and creeks of all other of his Britannic Majesty's dominions in America; and that the American sishermen shall have liberty to dry and cure sish in any
