Assembly. My occupations have been, in fact, both multiplied and continual. I have already had the honor of stating to you that the Assembly will finally perceive that those objects have not been neglected. Further, considering how many of them are, for the most part, of a complicated nature, and considering also the labour I have had to bestow upon discussing Mr. Stuart's Memorial, I flatter myself that all that will be expected from me, will be not to remain in arrear with my relations with the Colonial Office.
