

Trotting Closing Day At Dufferin

TRACK RECORD BY MARGOT LEONARD

Roy Patchen and Arthur L.
Also Winners on Closing
Day at Dufferin.

For the closing day of the Canadian Circuit, the Dufferin Driving Club were fortunate in having good weather, good track, good attendance and extra good racing. There were three races on the card—the 2:25 pace, a classified race, and the 2:15 trot. The fields were not large, but the 2:25 pace was a good contest from wire to wire. The spectators are to be congratulated on the interest shown in the races, and the fact that a larger attendance, as no better racing will be seen on any half-mile track in America than at Dufferin Park the next three days.

Next Wednesday the Toronto Driving Club will open their meeting at Hillcrest Park. There will be practically the same classes as at Dufferin this week, and there should be some very good racing. The first race called was the 2:25 pace class, with eight starters. Akorobau, in S. Feather's harness, was made the favorite, selling in the pools for \$10, \$10, \$10, Geo. Locanda, Roy Patchen, and the field for \$5. Birdie Bryson drew the pole, and Starter Upton had his troubles getting them away, as there were several bad actors. However, after using a great deal of patience he got them away to a good start. Roy Patchen, owned by R. Scott, who was trailing the pole horse, went to the front when Birdie Bryson made a break at the first turn. Roy was never headed and won quite easily, with Geo. Locanda second and Skip third. Time 2:20 1/2. When the word was given for the second heat, Akorobau made a determined bid from outside position for the pole, but Roy was there and took him a good, fast clip to the quarter, which came along and raced with Roy Patchen, but could never get to him, he winning the heat in 2:22, with Skip second and Victoria Poem third. In the final heat, Roy Patchen won from wire to wire. Nat. Williams, up behind, was a very close runner, but he could not reach the winner, finishing second, and Patchen Wilkes third.

A Track Record.
The 2:15 trot was won quite easily by Margaret Leonard, who now has the honor of holding the track record for trotters, stepping the first heat in 2:14 1/2. She

won her race in straight heats, and much credit is due her trainer and Driver Charles Dennis, as he has her in grand condition. Wilkes, a nice black trotter, owned by G. E. Doremus of Kalamazoo, Mich., was second in the last two heats, and he looks like a coming trotter. Another good trotter in the race was Lucy Van, owned by H. A. Monagle of Wilmington, Del. She was not at her best yesterday, and for a time it was not known that she would start, as she was under the care of a V.S.; however, her owner started her and she showed that she is a very fast trotter. Bernalgo won a good race, as did Lesa, but they both seem short of work. Ned Wilkes was not himself, did not show up as well as he will later on in the season.

The classified race half-mile heats John read uncovered a green one in Arthur L. and marched off, won the first, third and fourth heats. The racing was well conducted all thru.
