BRITISH WAR OFFICE WANTED BIG TRUCKS

Change in Policy Responsible for Employment of Heavier Machines.

By a Staff Reporter. OTTAWA, March 26 .- The public accounts committee held a brief session tonight, when they further investigated contracts for motor trucks. Col. Hurdman, inspector of transports, gave an explanation as to why the department had bought two-ton trucks, and later discarded them for the heavier machine After making their purchases the British War Office notified them of a change of policy.
