BRITISH TARIFF REFORM AND THE REFERENDUM.

Altho The World is and always has been in favor of an alteration in the fiscal system of the United Kingdom, not alone as advisable for the protection of its home workers, but because this is a necessary step in the movement for the introduction of an inter-imperial preferential trade policy, the position of tariff reform in the present British election should not be made other than it really is.

The World does not point this out with the intent of suggesting that tariff reform is not making headway in Great Britain. On the contrary it believes that the progress of the cause has been stayed. It is not now advancing with the leaps and bounds which characterized its earliest stages—it would be surprising if it were able to maintain its first rate of expansion.

PAST AND PRESENT TRANSPORTATION.

When a big fight on a matter in which the citizens' interests are closely touched is forward, The World is left to fight the Street Railway Company alone. When some matter of minor importance comes up upon which the company can be swatted with fine effect, without doing it any harm, there is a general clamor from the newspapers and the ward politicians, who think they can in this way decieve the people.

The recently adopted regulations have given rise to some inconvenience, as everybody expected, but on the whole, and considering the conditions, they have worked out very satisfactorily. Where they have failed it is on account of the failure of the company to live up to the terms of their agreement in matters which have been the subject of constant complaint in The World, but about which those who now clamor against the railway have never had a word of real moment to utter.

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DR. ELIOT'S PROPOSITION OF COMMISSIONAL RULE

President Emeritus of Harvard Ad. dresses Canadian Club on Democratic Tendencies.

Dr. C. W. Eliot, until recently president of Harvard University, made a profound impression on the Canadian Club yesterday, when one of the latest and most interesting of his addresses was read.

He spoke on "Democratic Tendencies—Safe and Unsafe," and afterwards, in reply to questions, enlarged on the advantages of the commission rule.

He read his speech, he explained, in order to get what he had to say into the time, but spoke freely on the commission question.

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tion due to free immigration, the abandonment of home interests and the tendency to class legislation.

Moreover, he proceeded, "most democracies exhibit a tendency to outdo aristocratic government in the creation of sinecures; but the sinecures are for the most part in the lower grades of the public service; more clerks are employed than are needed, more laborers are set to dig a ditch than are necessary to do the work, postmasters are allowed to hire for a fraction of their salaries assistants who do almost all their work; unnecessary substitutes are employed because the regular men are given short hours, longer vacations, or more holidays than are really needed. Most democracies increase expenses and diminish efficiency."

No Fixed Code. The hopeful and wholesome tendencies of democracy were next dwelt upon. Democracy recognizes no fixed permanent code. No single authority out of the past prevents progress in a Christian state as the fixed and unalterable authority of the Koran obstructs progress in Islam.

Democracy spends more money on education of all kinds, elementary and advanced, than any other form of government. It is the foundation of self-glories, which all democracies exhibit, notably the French, the American and the English.
