POWDERMAN OR ST BASS HOW POP FIGURES IT OUT

Horses at Woodbine Take Their Last Trials Before King's Plate Day.

The track yesterday morning was decidedly muddy, but the bottom was sound and the marvel of it was that there was no stickiness. A little dry weather and Woodbine will be as fast as it ever was since Leavitt first threw up its banks. It is doubtful if any track in America has as many good qualities and presents as much sound going as Woodbine, and that is the opinion expressed by a man whose limitations in training and caring for horses have not been confined to America.

Anyway, trainers were busy. They didn't ask their charges to go to the limit of their ability. They did not give instructions to have them whip out but they did much useful work—the conservative kind of work that will fit them well for their subsequent exertions.

There are not a few people who, in spite of all the laudation there, has been of St. Bass and Powderman believe that Mr. Seagram will add his 15th to his list of victories. He may do so and his pair, it must be acknowledged, went the journey in the conditions in exceptionally good style.
