

A NEW CONCEPTION OF BRITISH EMPIRE

World Has Received It as Result of Peace Conference, Says Borden.

London, May 23.—Sir Robert Borden was received by the King before leaving for Canada and afterwards met the Prince of Wales. Later he was welcomed by the Empire Parliamentary Association at the houses of parliament.

Speaking at Westminster, the premier said the result of nearly two months' deliberation at the peace conference had been greeted in some quarters with strong criticism and in others with doubt and hesitation, but for the most part it had been met with approval. Some said the terms were too severe, others desired severity to be carried far beyond any point that could be described as reasonable. Problems to be solved had been of unprecedented difficulty, complexity, and also of extraordinary range and variety. The Germans had fully accepted the terms and had expressed good understanding between the associated powers would be completely shattered and that no conclusion acceptable to all could be reached. With a little less patience that might easily have been the outcome. The wonder was that there was in the end absolutely unanimous adoption of the treaty.

Status of Dominions
When the representatives of the British dominions were summoned to London last November, they took as self-evident their status as self-governing nations within the British Commonwealth. In this they had received strong support from the prime minister and his colleagues. At the peace conference as upon the battlefield, the world had received a new conception of the status of the dominions. The total assessable frontage in Section No. 2 is 1,172 feet, to bear \$212, or 18-10-100 per cent. of the estimated cost, and spread over a period of three years, a rate per foot frontage per annum of 13-10-100 cents.

The special assessments are to be paid in three annual instalments, the first proposed work will not avoid to prevent its construction.
