

CIVIC EMPLOYEES TO GET HEARING

Royal Commission to Recon-
vene Tuesday to Unravel
Problems.

William Williams, president of the Civic Employees' Union, stated last night that the royal commission appointed to deal with the grievances of the civic employees would reconvene on Tuesday morning to decide the point as to whether the employees who worked less than 50 full weeks during the year because of snow, rain and other contingencies should be termed permanent employees and entitled to the privileges of two weeks' vacation, sick benefits and other now enjoyed by such employees. He stated that the union contended that no men should be considered as casual employees who, by reason of climatic or other unforeseen circumstances, have been unable to work the normal 50 weeks.

The commission will also decide whether or not employees who left the civic employ before the award was given out shall be entitled to the pay granted by that award, this payment to be made retroactive to a certain date set by the commission. About 140 men, strong in their opinion, are by the results of Tuesday's session.

Royal Commission Findings. The following charges were laid against the city of Toronto by the Civic Employees' Union in an interview with The World last night at the Labor Temple: 1. That there were nine hundred men among the employees who were entitled to the minimum wage of \$11 a week in accordance with the findings of the royal commission, appointed a year ago to deal with the grievances of the civic employees, most of these men being in the roadway department.

2. That there were men in the street sweeping department who had had several years' experience with the city, but who were not considered as casual help, and therefore, not entitled to the privileges permitted to the permanent employees; 3. That when men in the roadway department were laid off because of rain their pay was docked for the number of hours off. Most of these men, he said, were married and had families.

Satisfied Watchmen. Continuing, he pointed out that before the union took up the cudgels of the watchmen in the works department these were receiving \$22.80 a week for 105 hours' work. Commissioner Harris announced that the hours of the union to decrease the hours from 105 to 75, the weekly envelope to be decreased only \$1.80. "This move," he said, "is a direct attack on the works department. Commissioner Wilson, who was also popular with the men, found himself unable to reach a successful solution of the problem which was still pending. It was to be noted that the watchmen on the 75-hour schedule were not paid for the extra hours of the seven days which had been compulsory on the former schedule.

Less Than Expressmen. "I was asking men employed with the two express companies what they received," said this official. "The employees of the Canadian Express Company receive \$102 a month with uniform; the employees of the Dominion Express Company receive \$106 a month on the same basis. Now, the civic employees do not get any clothing allowance, yet their minimum is far below that of the expressmen. They are deserving of less consideration than they?"

GRAND TRUNK BAN MONTREAL FREIGHT

Only Carload Lots Carried if
Shippers Do Own
Teaming.

The Grand Trunk Railway Company have placed an embargo on freight to Toronto from Montreal, owing to labor troubles here with regard to teamsters, and will not accept less than carloads, and that only on condition that the shippers undertake to do their own teaming and delivery in Toronto.

The Montreal Board of Trade seem to be having trouble with the railway, and much discussion is going on between them and the railway commission respecting the effects of the order-in-council passed during the war, which provided for an increase of 25 per cent. which increase was put into force and maintained ever since. The order stated that such increase should remain in force until further notice. The local board of trade assert the railway company propose to now sharply increase the freight charges on cheese from all points in the Dominion. The railway commission have been appealed to, contending the old rate should remain in force until a new order-in-council was made. A decision has not yet been given by the board, and it is awaited with considerable anxiety, as it affects practically the whole cheese industry of the Dominion.
