BOWMANVILLE BOY DROWNED.

William Crawford, Passenger on the Tug "Snark" Near Vancouver.

Bowmanville, Aug. 1.—(Special)—Mrs. Wm. Crawford has received intelligence of the drowning of her grandson, William H. Crawford in the recent disaster near Vancouver, B. C. where the steamer Princess Victoria cut into the tug Chehalis, which was turned completely over, some of the passengers being drowned.

The unfortunate young man was a son of Mr. Wells W. Crawford, formerly of Bowmanville, and a nephew of Capt. A. W. Crawford, late of the Turbina, Toronto. He was 22 years of age, and was a student at Washington University, Seattle, and was intending to come east in September, to attend McGill University, Montreal, to finish his course in engineering. He was on a pleasure trip with other members of the ill-fated craft, at the time of the disaster.

TRIED TO ESCAPE. Montreal, Aug. 1.—(Special)—A convict named Joly tried to escape from St. Vincent de Paul, yesterday in a "guard's" uniform, but was captured. Joly is from Joliette and was sentenced six years ago to ten years in the penitentiary for stealing \$8000 from the C. P. R. station in his native place. His attempt at escape will cost him his good conduct allowance of a year and a half.

SPEEDY SUBURBAN JUSTICE FORGER GETS ONE YEAR

Bracondale Annexation Feeling Opposed by a Large Petition—Runaway in North Toronto

East Toronto, Aug. 1.—By means of a forged order, Frank Corley on Monday afternoon secured \$11 from Mrs. Robinson of Catherine-street. On Tuesday at noon he was arrested on Seaton-street by Constable Tidberry, and at 10.30 this morning Magistrate Ellis committed the prisoner to the Central Prison for one year. Such, in brief, is the history of speedy justice in East Toronto.
