## YOUR COLUMN

**CIVILIAN RIFLE ASSOCIATIONS.**

Editor World: If not trespassing too much on your space, kindly inform me of the regulations governing the organization of civilian rifle associations and much oblige.

Foresight.  
Ans. The formation and government of civilian rifle associations come under regulations promulgated in militia general orders 88, dated June 1, 1905. Members of civilian associations are enrolled in the reserve militia while members of such clubs or associations are managed under such regulations as may from time to time be issued by the department of militia and defence.

To form an association in a locality requires not less than forty men residing therein, and aged over sixteen years. Members must subscribe to the oath of allegiance to His Majesty. The captain is appointed to every association, who, with a committee of two members, manage the affairs of the association. The annual subscription is not less than \$1 per member. A member may resign on three months' notice to the captain, but must return all government property in his possession before the resignation can be accepted.

An association may be disbanded for grave irregularities or mismanagement, and an association maintaining less than forty members must disband. A member may be expelled by a two-thirds vote of the association to which he belongs. No man is allowed to belong to more than one association at one time. The D.O.C. in each military district is charged with the organization, after the necessary papers have been forwarded by him and approved by the minister of militia.

In the event of a national emergency any person who is or has been duly enrolled in any rifle association in Canada shall be deemed to be already enrolled in the reserve militia of the Dominion.

The arm used is the .303 rifle either of government issue or of bona-fide government pattern, and bearing the government mark. Associations may be supplied with rifles for the use of members on the captain's requisition, and on his furnishing a bond signed by three responsible members for the safety, preservation and safe return when required of all rifles issued.

Note.—Each rifle is valued at \$25.00. Ten rifles may be issued to each association of forty members, and five additional rifles for every twenty additional members.

## HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

### FRANCIS R. HUTTON DEAD VALUABLE CITY OFFICIAL

Board of Health Wants Grant for Laboratory—Radial Employees Included in Award.

Hamilton, Oct. 1.—(Special).—Francis R. Hutton of the city assessment department died unexpectedly at his home, 123 South Hughson-street, this afternoon. He was well-known all over the province, having taken an active part in framing the new Assessment Act, and he was regarded as an authority on the subject. Several weeks ago he was seized with typhoid fever, and although very ill his condition was not regarded as alarming. Heart failure was the cause of his death. He was born in Hamilton 45 years ago, and had lived here all his life. A widow, one son and one daughter survive him. He was a member of Court Family, No. 200, F. The funeral will be held at 3.30 Wednesday.

Ask Grant for Laboratory.  
Dr. Roberts, the medical health officer, got a committee of the board of health appointed this evening to wait upon the finance committee for a grant of \$1000 for a laboratory. He said that he had been informed that milk and sausage adulterated with boracic acid was sold in the city, and that he had no means of testing it. He also said that the examination of milk now was a farce. Chairman Quinn said that the practice of dumping vegetable matter now followed by the board of health was unsanitary and that it was necessary that an incinerator should be appointed to investigate. It will cost about \$15,000. The scavengers applied for an increase of 10 cents a day. A sub-committee was appointed to deal with the request. The board will state a case in the Stroud case to find out what the term "dead weight" means.

The jury that investigated the death of John Larman, who was fatally injured by being run over by a C.O.R. train at Welland, brought in a verdict of accidental death this evening.

Radial Men Also.  
There was a mix-up in giving out the award of the street railway arbitrators, and another meeting of the arbitrators will be held. It now turns out that the radial employees are to get the same increase as the H. and D. men. It is claimed that the company is discharging some of its employees and replacing them with non-union men.

The application of Klein and Binkley of a long lease of the city property was laid over by the markets committee this evening, as was the application of the Dowsell Manufacturing Co. for a license to use a piece of the city jail garden.

Too Much Noise About It.  
The members of the board of trade agreed this afternoon that the city should wash its dirty linen on the quiet, and not have it published broadly. That is, they agreed that the city should not have its dirty linen on the front page of the newspapers.

Mrs. Wells, an old lady, was found sitting on Paradise-road this afternoon. She refused to take any nourishment and was taken to the hospital for treatment. She would not give her address.

More People Counted.  
The minority shareholders of the H. G. & B. will appeal to the Ontario court to have the company's books and the agreements of the majority of the shareholders entered into with the company cancelled. A committee will wait upon the G.T.R. to see if the company's Stuart-street yards cannot be fixed up.

James Fuller, 21 Elgin-street, had a narrow escape from being killed by a car on Saturday near the Jockey Club. He jumped on the inside step of the car and was knocked off and fell between them. The stunned for a while did not receive any serious injury.

Thomas Murphy and John McKiver were arrested this morning on the charge of attempting to stab John Mullin at 100 St. Paul-street, near the Victoria Hotel. They were taken to police court but were so drunk that the magistrate would not try them this morning. They were remanded till tomorrow. A similar charge against Ernest Corser was also laid over. He was charged with threatening to stab Levi Ronald, but the charge will be amended to one of attempting to stab.

The assessors' returns show Hamilton to have a population of 61,443, an increase of about 1900 over last year. The assessors admit that they were unable to secure all the names of those residing in the city, but they were not so particular about that as to get the assessment of property. The increase in assessment will be about \$2,000,000 with an increase of revenue of about \$40,000.

W. R. Davis Selected.  
At a meeting of the executive of the Liberal Club on Saturday night, W. R. Davis was chosen as the successor to the late A. I. McKenzie as surveyor of customs. The position is worth \$1500 a year straight salary and about \$300 per annum fees. George Shamrock was a strong contender for the position.

New York, Oct. 1.—"The Republican party asks the support of all citizens. The necessary and legitimate expenses of the campaign will be heavy. This statement was issued by Timothy L. Woodruff, chairman of the Republican state committee, last night after a conference with Charles E. Hughes, George R. Sheldon, the new treasurer of the state committee, and leaders from the interior of the state.

In view of the agitation which followed disclosure as to the size and source of contributions in former campaigns, it was decided to accept no contributions from corporations, and to appeal to the rank and file in the party for funds.
