IT HAS STIRRED THEM UP

Finance Committee Takes Steps to
Counteract Fleming's Movements.

Don't Like the Idea of Hamilton
Concerns Moving to Toronto—
Minister of Customs Pays a Visit
—Police and Other Items of News
From the Ambitious City.

Hamilton, Oct. 28. (Special.)—The action of the Assessment Commission in seeking to attract Hamilton manufacturers to Toronto, has had the effect of stirring the Mayor and the Finance Committee to take steps to counteract such a movement, and also to devise a plan to encourage manufacturers to locate in Hamilton, when they are seeking new fields. The citizens are opposed to the system of assessing, but they are ready to support the city authorities in any scheme by which they can retain factories whose owners have been offered apparently superior inducements to move to other cities. The close method of assessment introduced by Mr. Hall's accession to the office of Commissioner is also a factor in the complaints. The Finance Committee and officials are meeting in private to discuss the situation and arrive at some plan of action.

St. Thomas Club Must Pay.
Judge Monck this morning gave his decision in the action brought by William Stroud, for the Hamilton Baseball Club, against the St. Thomas Club, to recover \$50.00, guarantee and gate percentages for two games scheduled, but not played, last September at St. Thomas. His Honor gave judgment for plaintiff for \$70 and costs, and a guarantee for the amount, which is now in the hands of President Carl Davis, who, as treasurer, holds money in reserve.

Hon. W. Patterson Here.
Hon. William Patterson, Minister of Customs, paid Hamilton a visit to-day, and heard a number of business men on customs matters at the Customs House. Several members of Parliament also called on him. Mr. Patterson, who was accompanied by his private secretary, John Reid, left for his Bradford home this evening.

No Money for the Dairyman.
George Watson, dairyman, before Judge Monck to-day, sought to recover \$100 for damages, alleged to have been caused to his horse and wagon last July, on King-street, through his horse being frightened by the electric road sprayer. The evidence given on behalf of the plaintiff showed no negligence on the part of the motorman, and the action was dismissed.

Police Points.
At the Police Court to-day John Burdington failed to establish a charge of fraud against Valentine Byrne, and the case was dismissed.

Young Amaranth Farmer Became Desperate—He's Now in Jail.

Orangeville, Oct. 28.—Robert Parkins, a young Amaranth farmer, was in love with Jennie Patterson of the same locality, but was unsuccessful in his wooing, as the girl had another and accepted lover—a street car conductor in Toronto, to whom she was to be married last Wednesday. On Sunday last Parkins went over to the Patterson farm with a loaded Winchester, and a revolver, and kept guard opposite the house all day, threatening to kill the girl and commit suicide. The police were sent for and he is now in the county jail.

A SAD FINDING.
Suicide of a Young Farmer's Wife Near Barrie.

Barrie, Oct. 28.—Mrs. James Sawyer, 30, the wife of a young farmer at Midhurst, about three miles north of here, committed suicide early this morning. Despondent, weak and in delicate health and somewhat melancholy, arose about 8 a.m. Her husband, James, was failing to find her after the house called her, and after a search found her body in the orchard. The body was found on the ground, and her footmarks were the only ones to be seen. She had been married about six years, and had a son 5 years old, Coroner Wells and Dr. Smith have left to make an enquiry.

Independent Forestry.

THE Ontario S.S. Convention.

At the Provincial Sabbath School Convention, having had a most successful meeting, elected the following officers: President, Thomas McGillicuddy, Toronto; general secretary, Alfred Day; corresponding secretary, Miss Jessie Munro; minute secretaries, Rev. Campbell, T. B. Edginton, and W. E. Tilley, Ph.D., Bowmanville; chairman of the Executive, Mr. J. A. Patterson, Toronto.

The Committee on Resolutions reported against military parades on Sunday, and will ask the Minister of Militia to have them discontinued. They also expressed alarm at the growing tendency to Sabbath desecration, and sympathized with the work of the Lord's Day Alliance. A further recommendation was to demand from the Dominion Government a prohibitory law, in view of the result of the prohibition.
