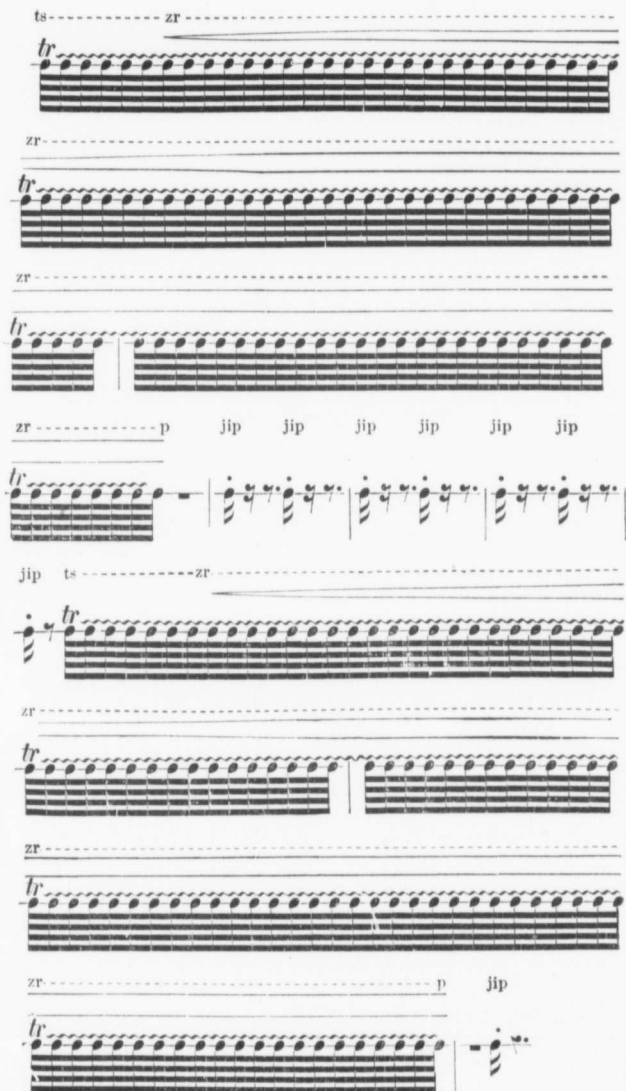


Fig. 49. Note of *Orchelimum vulgare*.
