THE CZAR IN GERMANY. Darmstadt, Oct. 10.-The imperia Russian train, with the Czar and Czarina, and their immediate suites, arrived here at 9 o'clock this morning. Their Majesties were met by the duca family of Hesse, headed by Gond Duke Ernest of Hesse, brother of the Czarina, and husband of Princess Victoria of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha. The imperial couple were driven to the new palace, amid great enthusiasm, through the gaily decorated streets. The Czar looked somewhat fatigued on his arrival here; but he was in good spirits and apparently pleased with his visit to France. The Czar-

Popular Demonstration in Hyde Park by London Workingmen.

London, Oct. 12.-An anti-Sultan de monstration was held in Hyde Park yesterday by the workingmen of London, and a large number of persons took part in the procession. The line was 50 minutes in passing. The procession was accompanied by bands, and many banners were carried. Twelve platforms had been erected in ad ressed the assemblage. Among these who made addresses were Henry Broadhurst, M.P., John Burns (Social M.P., and Rev. Hugh Price Hughes. They all denounced the Sultan, and set forth the horrors of the massacres by the rebels. of his Christian subjects. Resolutions were submitted to the assemblage and the British Government to bring renewed and increased pressure to bear The resolutions assured the Government that the workingmen take in this direction.

> RETREAT OF THE REBELS. In another letter, dated June 7, Dr. Rijnhart says: "You need not fear on our account as far as this war is concerned, as all the active rebel leaders are being caught and handed over to the Chinese army to be beheaded. About 60 have already lost their heads. Most of the rebels' arms, ammunition and horses have been given up, but the country round about us is far from being settled, as about 20,000 of the worst rebels have fled to the interior of Tibet, and must yet be looked after. The cavalry are to go after them in two or three days. "We expect to go to Tankar to remain for two or three months. place is described by Rockhill (Land of the Lamas, chap.
