ASK BIG BOOST IN PAY

10 Cents Per Hour 2 1/2 Round After
June 15.

TORONTO, April 29.—One thousand employees of the Toronto Railway Company, in mass meeting here last night, decided to ask for an all-round increase of 10 cents per hour in the wage schedule, to take effect June 15. IMPORTANT GAINS TO
ARMIES OF THE FRENCH
AROUND COURCY TOWN

Position Northwest of Rheims
"Enlarged Appreciably."

PARIS, April 29.—The war office communication tonight reads: "Along the Chemin-des-Dames the German artillery, energetically counter-shelled by us, bombarded our positions at Hurbetz. Grenade fighting likewise was lively in that region in the first lines.

"Northwest of Rheims and in Champagne we effectively shelled the German organizations. In the region of Courcy last night we took more than 200 prisoners. Calm prevailed on the rest of the front.

"Belgian communication: 'There is nothing to report except the usual artillery actions.'

"An earlier statement said that French troops last night attacked German positions near Courcy, northwest of Rheims, the war office announced. The gain was considerably great and 130 prisoners captured. German attacks in the Champagne failed. In Upper Alsace the French advanced as far as the second German line at several points, inflicting losses on their adversaries and bringing back prisoners.

"The text of the statement follows: 'Between the Somme and the Oise intermittent artillery engagements occurred. German attacks in the region of Lauffaux and north of Cerny-en-Leonois were broken up by our fire. In the sector of Craonne patrol encounters and grenade fighting occurred.'

"Prisoners Near Courcy.

"Northwest of Rheims operations carried out by us in the region north and south of Courcy enabled us to enlarge our positions appreciably. We took 100 prisoners in the course of these actions.

"There was heavy artillery fighting in the Champagne between Prunay and small French posts near Talmay and in the vicinity of the Navarin farm were without result.

"In Upper Alsace our detachments penetrated at several points as far as the second German line. Spirited grenade encounters terminated to the advantage and cost the German losses. We brought back prisoners."

SIR SAM OPENS FIRE UPON TWO OF COLLEAGUES

Says That Perley and White
Worked Against Him
in England.

NICE PRESS PROPAGANDA

Plotters After Him Because of
His Friendship for
Premier.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
LONDON, April 29.—Sir Sam Hughes today took advantage of his renunciation by the Conservatives' convention of his constituency here to bitterly condemn enemies within his own party who, he said, assisted in his "down-fall."

"Political ambition seems to have been aroused," said Sir Sam, "and while I was lending my best energies toward our soldiers and the successful prosecution of war, agitators toward my downfall were being planned."

Sir Sam declared that from the very outbreak of war, Sir George Perley had been actively seeking to create an unhealthy atmosphere against him (Sir Sam), in England. He said that Sir Perley and Finance Minister Sir Thomas White seemed to have peculiar newspaper influence with Canadian Press Association overseas, and they used it against him.

Sir Sam vigorously defended his administration, and drew attention to the fact that no commission found anything against him.

A Lien in Riding.

The war-time night was commemorated without a dissenting voice, to contest Victoria and Halliburton in the next general election. Sir Sam spoke for an hour and "there was something done every minute."

Alluding to the interferences in Britain by Sir George Perley, Sir Sam claimed they had a disintegrating effect on the Canadian troops. For the First Division the contracting and the entire organization were unique. Almost every known rule of war was departed from and in every case, Sir Sam claimed, his judgment proved correct.

Sir Sam referred to the attacks in March of last year upon his old shell committee and himself. The chief friends of the group known as the National party were very active for some time, he said, in adverse criticism of General Berran and all connected with the shell committee, but the Meredith-Duff commission found nothing but absolutely correct.

Perley Against Him.

"From the outbreak of the war Sir George Perley has always been active seeking to create an unhealthy atmosphere against me in England," he said, "and the finance minister seemed to have had certain newspaper influence. The Canada Press Association, which in England paid by the money of Canada, is associated indirectly with him. I have in vain endeavored to get criticism sent to Canada. Perley was, therefore, a fit agent to be appointed the new minister."

Attacks On the Papers.

A Journal in Toronto, upon which the finance minister often served and which is generally regarded as his Toronto organ, was attacked by the Montreal papers owned by a brother of that gentleman, were insistent in their criticism. Another plan or scheme seems to have been the sweetening of the newspaper and incidentally secured to a considerable extent the Yankee newspapers. The government, paid for by the poor people of Canada in connection with loans, press and secure neutral, if not favorable, consideration and comment.

Liberals Intend.

Sir Sam said that the reference to the material for the Liberal party was made to the leaders of the Liberal party, but one and all assured me that they knew nothing about any such attack. The rumors had included reports that some subordinate of the Liberal party had been making a statement to a leading American financial magnate that I should not be made to destroy me, and I was urged to cancel my trip.

"Thinking the reference was to torpedoes, I laughingly passed it off. The gentleman assured me however that it was not torpedoes at sea he referred to, but evasive poison on the part of the Liberal party. I was told that some of my own colleagues in the Liberal party were seeking to get rid of the prime minister," he said, "but realize that you are seeking to get rid of him must first get rid of you."

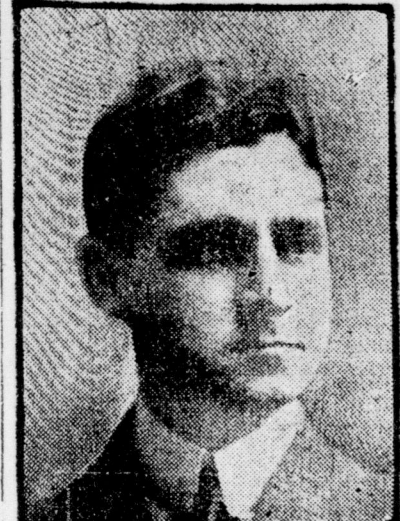
"I immediately wrote from New York to the prime minister, giving him a brief summary of this, and told him that in case anything turned up he was to cable me promptly, and I would turn instantly. I have never yet been able to ascertain how the New York financial magnate became possessed of the information."

Sir Sam then criticized the appointment of Sir George Perley as Canadian minister. If there was anything wrong with the finances in England in connection with Canadian troops overseas, a finance minister in England was much more necessary than an overseas minister of militia. Sir Sam said he had known that in 1915 the convalescent system in England was broken down and the system has now become the model for every warring nation—enemy or friend.

In one year it saved Canada upwards of six millions of dollars.

"But I also knew," continued Sir Sam, "that the business end of the medical service was badly in need of reorganization. This I proceeded to tackle in 1916. It has been greatly improved, but stands in need of much greater improvement. The pet V. A. D. matrimonial bureau system, dear to the hearts of colonialists of the Sir George Perley brand, was marked for reformation. He also had other plans for reformation."

organizing the forces, not one of which has been materially interfered with except to the injury of the service, and at great cost to Canada.

"But the high finance, the sweetening of the press of Canada—the attempts to influence the bankers and the United States were being paid at the cost of Canada, all these and more, who have been taxed millions of dollars thereby, are," he said, "becoming understood by the general public."

Recruiting Retarded.

Dealing with efforts at recruiting Sir Sam stated that in March last year a deal of representations to the Government by munition and other manufacturers that the enlistment of men was robbing them of their labor, he had been asked not to press recruiting. As a result recruiting today is and has been dead in Canada.

Alluding to the fact that not dangerous jobs were readily filled, but for the gallant boys in the trenches there was little or no home support. He reminded the audience that the war was far from being finished. It has cost one million men on the Somme this year alone. Sir Sam expressed regret to read in the Ottawa Journal-Freeze, the Government organ, that the suggestion of compulsory service for all in Canada except the province of Quebec.

"We have discovered," he said, "that the so-called peace societies of Canada and the United States were being paid by German gold." He had been charged with preventing a general election. If that was a criticism, he was proud of it.

The cabinet he described as "fifteen members, more or less opined."

THOUSAND U. S. SURGEONS
WILL BE SENT TO EUROPE

Washington, April 29.—Plans for sending one thousand American surgeons to Europe for service in the war were announced today by the general medical board of the council of national defense. The men will be picked by the American College of Surgeons, and the aim is to have them in the firing line within three months.

RUSSIANS REPULS ENEMY.

PALUS, April 29.—The official statement from Macedonia says: "Eastern Theatre, April 28.—There was a curious scene today in front, especially in the region of Lake Doiran and Monastir, where an enemy battery was annihilated. In the Zovine zone the Russians repulsed an enemy detachment."

CANADIANS CAPTURE VILLAGE OF ARLEUX; POWERFUL POSITION

Victory of Saturday Ranks
With That of Vimy.

OPENS WAY TO CAMBRAI

Von Hindenburg Had Ordered
Position Held at All
Costs.

CANADIAN HEADQUARTERS IN FRANCE, via London, April 29.—(By Stewart Lyon, special correspondent, Canadian Press.)—The capture of Arleux, and no counter-attack upon Arleux has been yet made, after the hard fighting in the village yesterday morning, much of it with the bayonet, in cellars, and among the ruins of the houses which were many times passed over by the Canadians. After the enemy had been repelled, the Canadians dug themselves in to the west of Fresnoy, and prepared for a counter-attack. The Canadians had been warned that there were many tunnel-like passages between Arleux and Fresnoy, and that the cellars of Arleux must be thoroughly cleaned up and carefully watched to prevent the enemy emerging in the rear. This was done.

The reports show that many grim conflicts took place in the labyrinth of the ancient passageways and above ground. The enemy made but one attempt to counter-attack, and that was broken up and the enemy dispersed by artillery fire before he reached the front line for another concentration.

700 Germans Cut Up.

It is estimated that 700 Germans were caught in the open while marching in four toward Fresnoy, and fearfully cut up by the concentrated artillery fire directed upon it by an aerial observer, who afterwards reported the force practically destroyed. Discouraged by his heavy losses, the enemy became quite about dark.

After sixteen hours' fighting and digging our men slept on conquered ground. There they are still under intermittent shelling, but vastly more comfortable than the enemy, who is under a grueling fire from our batteries, which he has learned to fear.

The oddest story yet emerged from the action concerned a Chicago man who was visiting in Germany when the war broke out, and was forced to serve because he was German by birth, and had never become naturalized in the United States. This citizen, when made a prisoner in Arleux, has been set to work as a stretcher-bearer. After helping to carry particularly husky Canadians up-hill to a dressing station the Chicago man was about "all in."

He threw himself down on the ground and astonished everyone around by saying, as he indicated with a sweep of his arm his late companions, "I told these infernal fools nearly three years ago, what was going to happen to them; now it's happening."

The man from Chicago was made use of after that in a less fatiguing way in green front headquarters. There was a curious scene today when war trophies which are to be shipped to Canada were being cleared up by prisoners taken yesterday, while groups of our men who were on Sunday leave, stood round, good-naturedly chaffing them.

Arleux Prisoners 360.

The total prisoners from Arleux taken now number 360, of whom eight are officers. The enemy still is ingenious in his strategy. Helms and other things in demand as trophies are being left by the retreating enemy fastened to the walls of houses and dugouts in such a way as to cause an explosion when wrenched free.

Once again the Canadians have driven German picked troops from carefully prepared positions which they were confident of holding.

In the grey dawn of this (Saturday) morning, after an artillery bombardment of great intensity, the troops

advanced under the protection of a barrage which swept the ground through which they had to pass with a hail of steel and attacked the village of Arleux.

Going forward in steady waves, each like an incoming tide, encroaching on the defence of the Germans further than that preceding, our men passed through the remains of what a few days ago were excellent strong wire entanglements erected or strengthened since the battle of Vimy by the continual labor of thousands of the enemy and ordered to be held at all costs to prevent the further encroachments of the British army upon the plain towards Douai.

Advances On Oppy.

The British to the south advanced simultaneously from their positions near Vimy against the fortified village of Oppy, which lies midway between Arleux and Gavelle.

Vimy Ridge Over Again.

Later from a ridge above Farbus, whence a view could be obtained of the Arleux-Oppy slope, up which the Canadian and British advance was made, I watched the tremendous spectacle of the last fierce burst of fire from hundreds of guns. It was Vimy Ridge over again.

The infantry went forward in the half light of dawn, and from the ridge the German force could be seen only by the lifting of the barrage from time to time as the enemy gave way. He had been taken by surprise, our men passed on, and while expecting the attack, a few of the higher officers were in their dugouts or front trenches when our assault was launched. For a time the Germans gave evidence of a lack of direction or control, but they speedily rallied and put up a stiff fight from the cellars of Arleux and had to be driven out with bayonets on their rifles.

Manitobans Cut Through.

The "moppers-up," as the men who clean up the enemy's dugouts are called, had a big task on the right of the line. A Manitoba battalion was held up for a time by uncured wire skillfully placed machine guns behind it, and suffered considerably before it could cut its way through and reach its objective. By 7 o'clock, however, Arleux had been captured, and the triumphant Manitobans had joined their comrades.

On the far east end of the town where our troops had dug in to resist possible counter-attacks, the enemy's artillery earlier in the action had been firing spasmodically on Willerval and Farbus wood, and was strongly forced later in the morning. To meet it, as well as to prevent German concentrations, our heavy artillery directed effective fire into the enemy's new line, which included the village of Fresnoy, the center of Arleux. Here the Germans are only about nine miles from Douai.

Canadians Bite Deeply.

The bite taken out by the Canadians this morning was about 2,500 yards in length, with the penetration of the enemy's line at the deepest point of about 1,000 yards. A feature of the action was a procession of our stretcher cases across the open plain, borne by German prisoners. They came across the fire-swept zone carrying either our wounded, who, even when badly hit, enjoyed the triumph of being thus served by the enemy, or their own seriously wounded. The number of prisoners who have already passed through unwounded are about 200, while over 100 wounded enemies are being cared for by our surgeons. These figures are liable to be increased.

Some of these prisoners are of the Hanoverian battalion, and only came to the aid last night. Their officers wore armlets with the word "Gibraltar" on them, in commemoration of the part they played in defense of the rock when Britain's king was also king of Hanover.

The capture of Arleux has added to the feeling of confidence on the part of our troops that with artillery support such as they have had in recent action they are better fighting men than Fritz, and can make him so steadily.

Rev. Mr. Holmes gave the lodge a splendid sermon on "Brotherly Love," which was highly appreciated by the members. Huron Lodge has had a splendid year, a large gain in members, besides having some thirty members at the front.

BRITISH RETAINING POSITIONS CAPTURED IN BALKAN ADVANCE

Teutons' Efforts To Expel the
Tommies a Failure.

OFFENSIVE PROGRESSES

Enemy's Trenches on Struma
Front Successfully
Raided.

London, April 29.—Severe fighting continues on the Macedonian front, where the British took the offensive last week. The war office today announced that an effort to expel the British from positions captured had been defeated. The statement follows:

"Telegraphing on Sunday night, the commander-in-chief of Saloniki reports that on our Dobruja-Vardar front, the enemy maintained a heavy bombardment against the positions gained by us, and on the night of Saturday made an attack in strength. The attack was beaten off, the enemy being heavily wounded. On our Struma front we raided enemy trenches near Keuprit, killing a few occupants. The remainder fled."
