The military police say that two sons, who fired on the police while resisting arrest, will be taken no matter what the cost. The provost marshal arrived in the city this morning.

Paris, March 10.—Premier Clemenceau, as president of the peace conference, has sent a letter to the head of the inter-allied commission at Trieste, advising him that the military commission appointed by the supreme council to investigate the Italo-Jugo-Slav incidents, which caused the recent acute feeling between the two peoples, will proceed at once to Laibach.

Labor Delegates Will Advocate Thirty-Hour Week

Winnipeg, March 10.—At a meeting of the trades and labor council last evening, called for the purpose of instructing the delegates from the council and various unions in regard to the business likely to come before the western labor convention, which opens at Calgary next Thursday, it was unanimously decided to strongly advocate a six-hour day and a five-day week, or a 30-hour week. Another resolution adopted was one which called for the Canadian labor convention held last summer at Quebec for organization by industry and not as at present by craft.

HEAVY HOWITZERS DIRECTED ON BREWERY HELD BY SPARTACANS

Rioting in Halle, Germany, Results in Number of Casualties, Government Troops Eventually Gaining Control of Situation.

LONDON, March 10.—A German wireless dispatch received here gives a semi-official bureau's report of recent happenings at Halle. Fighting broke out at 10 o'clock Wednesday night, when the Spartacans opened fire with field guns and mine throwers on police headquarters, until late Friday night. It is said there were isolated encounters even as late as Saturday morning. The dispatch adds that, even if final resistance has not yet completely broken down, the crisis may be regarded as safely passed.

IMPERIAL STANDARD HOISTED OVER PALACE IN GERMAN CAPITAL

COPENHAGEN, March 9.—On Saturday night Spartacans hoisted the imperial standard over the palace at Berlin, according to advices received here from the German capital. The flag was immediately removed by Government troops.

MAJORITY SOCIALISTS CONTROL SITUATION IN CITY OF MUNICH

Berlin, March 7.—Advices from Munich indicate the situation there is quiet and that the Majority Socialists are in the ascendant. The Soviet Congress has voted to release hostages held at the time that Kurt Eisner, the Bavarian premier, was assassinated. The strike situation in Central Germany is reported to be improving.

SIXTY ARE MURDERED BY SPARTACANS IN THE POLICE COURT

Amsterdam, March 10.—Spartacans Sunday occupied the Berlin suburb of Lichtenberg and murdered sixty persons, according to the Zeitung Am Mittag. The Lichtenberg police station had withstood Spartacans' attacks since Tuesday.

6,000 INDIVIDUALS IN BERLIN SUFFER LOSSES IN SPARTACAN RAIDS

Berlin, March 9.—The number of individuals who suffered property losses in their homes during the Spartacans' fighting in Berlin last week is estimated at 6,000. The number of houses destroyed, however, is not known. It is said that the Spartacans' heavy losses through damage to buildings and the loss of property, including the loss of 150,000,000 marks, were estimated at 3,000,000 marks. The losses of the past week added to those of the week of the first Spartacans' strike are likely to involve the city of Berlin or the state or national government in damages totaling more than 150,000,000 marks.
