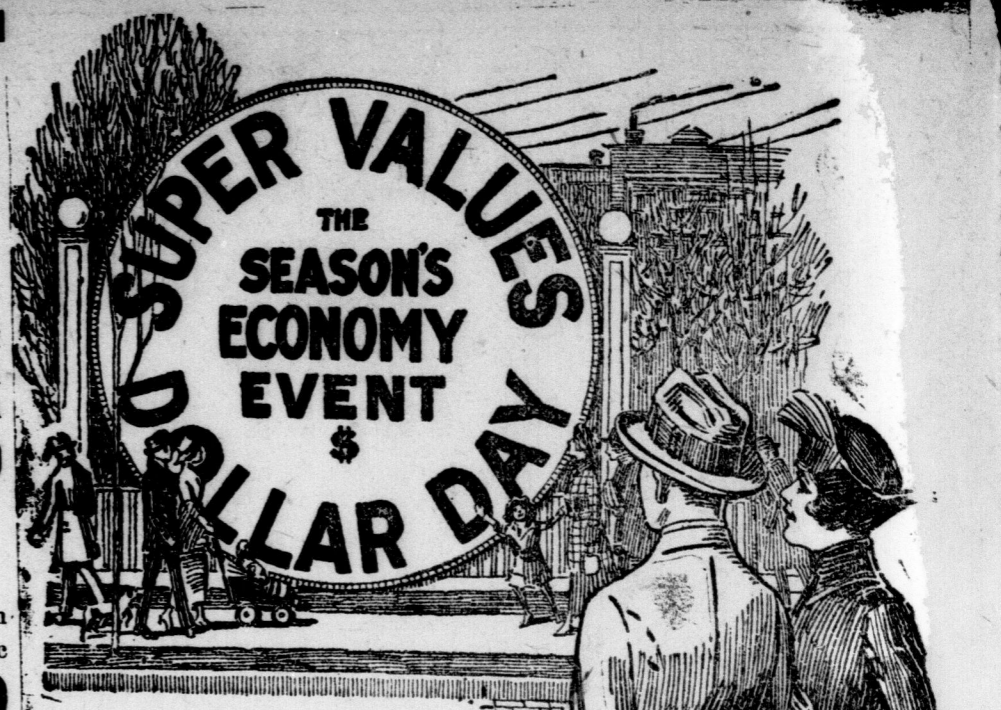

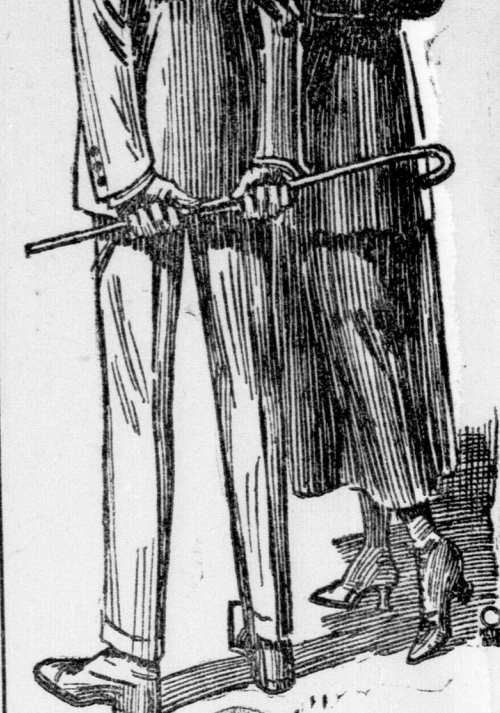

POLICE UNEARTH PLOT TO SELL BOGUS DOPE

Corn Flour Peddled to Chinamen in Saskatoon as Morphine.

ARRESTS ARE MADE

Seventy Bottles of the Harmless "Drug" Found on Prisoners.

SASKATOON, Aug. 19.—With the arrest of Edward O'Rourke and R. M. Gregory of Winnipeg, police here have uncovered a clever plot to sell thousands of dollars worth of bogus morphine to Chinese residents of western Canada. O'Rourke, alias Arthur Bowman, was taken into custody on information received from the authorities in Winnipeg, where he is wanted to answer to a charge of receiving some \$1,700 under false pretences. In O'Rourke's possession was about 70 bottles of corn flour which he was in the act of peddling as dope. Gregory, alias Schell, is held as an accomplice.

FATAL STRIKE RIOT AT PACKING PLANT AT CUDAHY, WIS.

One Man Killed, Eight Others Injured.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Aug. 19.—One man was killed, eight others were shot, two probably mortally wounded, and scores of others cut and bruised in a riot of strikers from the Cudahy packing plant at Cudahy, Wis., near here to-night. The outbreak occurred when women from the office force attempted to leave the plant and were stoned by wives of the strikers. When deputies attempted to escort the workers to safety, the women rioters resorted to their husbands, and when the men joined the fighting officers were helpless under a fusillade of missiles. Firing was begun. Each side accuses the other of starting the gunfire.

Miner Rescued 18 Missing in Mine Disaster

Rescue Work at Oakview Mine Is Going Forward.

TRINIDAD, Colo., Aug. 19.—One man has been rescued alive and not more than eighteen men are believed to be dead in the Oakview mine of the Oakdale Coal Company, near Laveta, which was wrecked by an explosion yesterday. The explosion, said to have been caused by gas, took place about a mile and a half inside the workings. William Davis, a miner, was rescued alive. About 40 men were in the mine when the explosion occurred. Ten came out of the main slope and about ten others escaped by way of an old slope. Rescue work was going forward rapidly today.

SUPREME COUNCIL AN INTERNATIONAL GOVERNMENT BODY

PARIS, Aug. 19.—The supreme council is no longer a conference, but a sort of government, occupied with the international affairs of every country in Europe. The intrinsigant reports Signor Tittoni, the Italian foreign minister and member of the peace conference, as having said at Monday's meeting of the council. "Everybody is worn out by the present tension." Signor Tittoni continued. "This situation cannot continue. The conference ought to bring things to a conclusion. The remaining treaties ought to be terminated before thinking of taking a holiday." Signor Tittoni insisted that there would be danger in postponing the Asia Minor question until October and demanded that the conference should not forget its objective, as he declared it seemed to be doing.

PROPOSED TREATY DOES NOT CONFLICT WITH U. S. CONSTITUTION

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—The proposed treaty, by which the United States would go to the aid of France in event of an unprovoked attack by Germany, is not in conflict with the constitution, in the opinion of the Senate Judiciary subcommittee appointed to consider the question.

CROWD EXPECTED TO HEAR H. DEWART AT AILSA CRAIG TODAY

Everything Ready For Big Liberal Nomination Gathering.

[Special to The Advertiser.] AILSA CRAIG, Aug. 19.—Everything is in readiness for the big gathering of Liberals at Ailsa Craig today, when the nomination of a candidate for North Middlesex will take place. H. Hartley Dewart, provincial Liberal leader; Duncan C. Ross, M.P.; J. C. Elliott, M.P.; and others, will deliver addresses, and preparations have been made to handle a record crowd. This will be the first appearance of Mr. Dewart on a public platform in Middlesex since his elevation to the position of provincial Liberal leader, and as a result there has been great interest shown in his coming address here.

DOMINION POLICE AND R. N. W. M. P. MAY BE AMALGAMATED

two forces at the present time and unification is seriously considered. There are at present two distinct forces under two distinct heads and responsible to two separate ministers, both aiming at the same end though under different conditions. The Mounted Police, under Comptroller McLean and Commissioner Perry, are responsible to Hon. N. W. Rowell, president of the privy council. The Dominion police at present have no permanent head, but are responsible to Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice. Both forces are engaged in the federal enforcement of law. Number increased. Recently the Royal Northwest Mounted Police have been increased in numbers and their jurisdiction has been extended to cover all that country from west of Fort William to the Pacific coast. Recruiting was carried on at many points and the force now numbers 1,750, as against about 350 when war ceased. Recruiting has, however, been temporarily stopped owing to the fact that for the present the class of men wanted are mostly resting from the war and are not willing at one to do the new uniform and engage in the new service. Shortly after the armistice C. H. Cahlan, the director of public safety, proposed the extension of the Dominion police throughout the Dominion for the purpose of checking Bolshevik tendencies. His scheme was not adopted, but the extension of the Mounted Police was something in the nature of a compromise along the lines suggested. West Might Oppose. Obviously the advocates of amalgamation of the two forces into one do not reckon with the tradition attached to the "Riders of the Plains," and it is not believed to be either desirable or practicable. force could not bear that name, because it would not be applicable to those located in Eastern Canada, and conceivably the west would not give up the name without serious opposition. It might be possible to bring the two forces under one head, or at least under one minister, while preserving identity of each force and also the name. To merge them under one name is not believed to be either desirable or practicable.
