



At the present a case is taken in the superior court The order violates the Ontario Rail-way and Municipal Board's order that, Ottawa says that centralization would use and legal functionaries around them constitute one of the most important institutions of the Province of Quebec, and that no public man or government could ever lay hands on the system and expect to live long.

Sir Wilfrid told a recent delegation to ask Sir Lomer Gouin to centralize his courts and thus solve the difficulty, but altho the delegation has not yet met the local premier, it is well known that the Quebec authorities will not act upon the suggestion. In the meantime an independent court of review, composed of three Montreal judges and one from the Quebec district, is advocated by ome as a way out of the difficulty.

Adjourned a Week. The case against Dr. Allan Cook, charged with procuring an abortion on Dolly Catmore, was adjourned again by Magistrate Kingsford yesterday afternoon for a week. Crown Attorney Corley thought there was sufficient evidence to commit. There was one more witness, but all he could say was that he had furnished the name and address.
