Windsor Stake Events.
WINDSOR, April 26.—The July run-
ning meeting at the Windsor course is
going to be a very brief one this sum-
mer. In comparison with those of pre-
vious seasons, it seems likely, from the
make list, which has just been sent out,
that it will have sufficient interest
to atone for its brevity. There are
seven events, and the first meeting,
July 16 to 23. Seven stakes are listed
for this meeting, so that there will be
one for each day. Nothing like this has
ever been offered before.

Frontier Handicap, which inaugurates
the meeting, and which will be worth
\$2000, will be the winner, \$100 to second
and \$50 to third. The list of stakes,
which closes on May 12, follows:
Frontier Handicap, for 2-year-olds and
upward, value \$2000, of which \$1000 goes
to the winner, \$200 to second and \$100
to third. One and one-half miles.
D. B. I. & W. Perry Company Handicap,
for 2-year-olds and upward, value
\$1000, of which \$500 goes to the winner,
\$100 to second, and \$50 to third. One
mile.

This season, because of the new law

was, with the big slates and the
regular sheltered booth system. This will
be much appreciated by the public, which
never felt strongly for the lawn book-
