



About Five Feet of Road Bed Will Be Cut From Gallow's Hill.

IS BIG UNDERTAKING

Large Number of Men Have Been Engaged All Week on Work.

Excellent progress is being made by the city engineer's department in the lowering of the Gallow's Hill grade north of the Battle of the Boyne, was the first celebration in West Toronto since 1506, and was very successful. 

This is a strong argument in their favor, and they will endeavor to show the railway board that an order should not be granted. SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NOR WEST LAND REGULATIONS. The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required, except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$3.00 per acre.

Duties.—six months' residence in each of three years, after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres' extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead in certain districts. Price, \$3.00 per acre.

Duties.—Must reside six months in each

acre.
