Four Hundred and Seventy-One Vessels Sunk in Three Months

London, May 18.—Four hundred and seventy-one British vessels have been sunk in the three months since the admiralty began issuing statements without giving the tonnage of vessels. In that period over 65,000 vessels have entered or left British ports. Of the ships sunk 250 have been of over 1,400 tons. 113 have been below that tonnage, and 108 have been fishing craft.

ITALIANS MAINTAIN ALL GROUND WON

Consolidate Captured Positions, Beating Off All Counter-Attacks. FOE'S REAR BOMBED Ally Taken Over Six Thousand Prisoners in Big Advance.

Rome, May 18, via London.—Austro-Hungarian prisoners taken by the Italians in their offensive on the Julian front are known to number 9425, says the official statement issued today by the Italian war department.

The Italian announcement says that from Tolmino to the sea the artillery was active. Efforts made by the Austro-Hungarians against the new Italian positions on the Vodic and south of Graziana were repulsed.

The text of the statement reads: "Yesterday our troops were engaged in fortifying the important position captured east of Gorizia and organizing communication with the rear. The enemy attempted, but completely failed, to hinder the work of our Gorizia army."

"Last night the enemy, under cover of darkness, attempted surprise attacks upon our positions on the bridgehead of Gorizia and organized communication with the rear. The enemy attempted, but completely failed, to hinder the work of our Gorizia army."

"The number of prisoners thus far taken is known to be 6432, including 143 officers. It is not yet possible to estimate the quantity of war material taken."

"All along the front from Tolmino to the sea the artillery continues very active. Gorizia again has suffered very heavy damage."

"During last night one of our airships, under cover of the clouds, reached the enemy's rear lines east of Gorizia, without being observed and bombed his encampments and returned safely."

YOUNG MAN KILLED IN AUTOMOBILE WRECK Badly-Mangled Body Found Under Smashed Car in Ditch Near Lawrenceville.

Special to The Toronto World. Cornwall, May 18.—Judson Rhodes, of Port Jackson, aged 21, was found dead under his wrecked automobile near Lawrenceville yesterday morning. The body was crushed and mangled almost beyond recognition.

Ottawa, May 18.—"If negotiations for a settlement of the difficulties in the western mining areas prove unavailing, the mines won't be shut down. The government will see to it they are run all right," remarked Hon. T. W. Crothers, minister of labor, today.

Premier Lovett said: "The most serious crisis in the modern history of Russia has been satisfactorily settled, and conditions already show marked symptoms of improvement. It is my impression that the new coalition cabinet will receive the support of all reasonable Russian citizens. We have stated from the first the prospect of a government which will combine both moral authority and material power."

Huns Spread False Report Of Truce Made With Russia London, May 18.—According to an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Amsterdam, it is rumored that the Hague that a truce is about to be arranged between Russia and the central powers as a result of the political changes at Petrograd. The rumor is characterized as of German origin.

BRITISH GUNS ENGAGE INFANTRY OF ENEMY Take Under Fire Bodies of German Troops Near Fresnoy.

Belgium Engage in Spirited Fighting With Trench Artillery.

Paris, May 18.—The war office communication issued this evening says: "The day was comparatively quiet. No infantry action was reported. Intermittent cannonading took place on most of the front. It was violent towards the Moisy farm and in the Corneilles sector."

Belgian communication: "On the whole of the Belgian front the night was quiet. In the region of Stenvert and Hiel Sae however, the fighting by means of trench artillery was rather spirited. On both sides of the Yser, in the vicinity of Dixmude, and also in the Driegvoeten and Steenstraete sector, reciprocal bombardments took place."
